- A series of slides showing the development of the Lansing school system.
- 3. Mrs. Lloyd Darling, president of the Lansing Board of Education, will speak on the future developments of public education in the community.
- 4. Preview of a film, Education in Lansing the first 100 years. This film has

been produced by the Visual Aids division of the Board of Education to show the contrast between pioneer schools and those of the present day.

The film will be widely shown during the Centennial period. The Society is fortunate in booking this preview.

Special guests for this program are members of the retired teachers group. Mrs. Earl Fohl is our chairman for the evening. The usual coffee and social hour will follow, with arrangements in charge of Mrs. V. M. Curry.

THE NORTH Of particular interest to LanFAMILY IN sing area residents is an artiLANSING cle describing the contribution of the North family to the development of early Lansing. The article, written by W. Glenn Norris, county historian, is the second of a series titled "The North Family -- Pioneers in Lansing, Ohio, Iowa, and Nebraska."


The TOWN CRIER announces that prizes will be offered for the recipe bearing the earliest date and for the most unusual recipe submitted.
