#### PUBLICITY COMMITTEE MEETS

Mr. R. D. Burroughs held a meeting of the Publicity Committee at his home, 6038 Abbott Road, East Lansing, September 16. Plans for the publicity of the Society were discussed.

The publication of "Heritage" was discussed and it was the opinion that it should be reserved for material of lasting interest—to preserve some of the fine material which has been presented at our meetings. This would include Mrs. Adamson's "Men of Medicine in Early Lansing", Mrs. Stucky's paper on the social life of early Lansing, "To Lansing with Love", the paper by Dr. Frank N. Elliott, "Early Transportation in Ingham County and Lansing", Bob Clark's fine paper telling of the history of land in "Michigan, Michigan" and Carlyle Carver's story of early Lansing industries.

Many suggestions were made to create interest in the Society: TV appearances of some of our members; radio announcements; a show of articles or materials collected by our own members; a "swap" meeting of articles in our collections which some of us could "part" with.

"MR. MICHIGAN STATE" OCTOBER SPEAKER

"Michigan State Athletics from 1925 to 1955" is to be the topic of Representative Ralph H. Young when he speaks at the October meeting of the Historical Society of Greater Lansing.

Born in Indiana, Young attended Washington and Jefferson University and took part in all athletics. While attending the University of Chicago, he played football under Alonzo Stagg, who at 93, is the oldest coach in football today in America. At the University of Michigan he played football under Fielding H. Yost. He was a track star and coach. The track field at M.S.U. is named the Ralph Young Track Field in his honor.

He came from Kalamazoo College to Michigan State in 1923 where he coached Michigan State football. In 1927, he was appointed athletic director of Michigan State, when he devoted full time to the job of building up all phases of athletics in the fast-growing college. At that time Harry G. Kipke took over as football coach. Mr. Young played a very important part in the negotiations which resulted in Michigan State's being admitted to the Western Conference and a member of the BIG 10.

He has been active in many Olympic endeavors and in the national collegiate athletic and coaching associations. Besides his athletic interests, Mr. Young has been active in patriotic affairs, having served as commander of the William Riker Johnson post, American Legion, in East Lansing.

After his retirement from M.S.U., he decided to serve his community. He became a candidate for the state legislature and sought the Republican nomination for representative from the second district of Ingham County. He was elected to the House of Representatives in 1956 and has served on the committees on public safety, educational institutions, juvenile corrections and metropolitan affairs.

## 85th ANNUAL MEETING OF HISTORICAL SOCIETY OF MICHIGAN

Barbara Symons of the Historical Commission reports about 125 persons attended the annual meeting of the State Society held at Kalamazoo September 25 and 26. Sessions were held at Hotel Harris, Western Michigan University, the Public Library and Kalamazoo College.

The dinner speaker was R. Carlyle Buley, Indiana University who talked on "Pioneer Medicine in the Middle West". Miss Symons report it was very good--both humorous and scholarly.
