CONGRATULATIONS TO RAYMOND DARWIN BURROUGHS

THE NATURAL HISTORY OF THE LEWIS AND CLARK EX-PEDITION by our distinguished member, R. D. Burroughs, is to be available shortly. One advance copy is in Mr. Burroughs' possession from his publisher, the Michigan State University Press. Copies may be obtained from bookstores in Lansing and East Lansing.

Burroughs, supervisor of conservation education for the Michigan Department of Conservation, an educator and biologist, made intensive studies of the diaries and records of the Lewis and Clark exploration and his book gives a biological study of the birds and mammals of that famous expedition.

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He has served as game biologist and education consultant for the Conservation Department since 1937. In 1949, he assumed responsibility for teacher training and school education phases of the Department's program.

Before joining the Department, Burroughs was professor of biology at Williamette University at Salem, Oregon and Macalester College, St. Paul, Minnesota. He also was visiting assistant professor of zoology at the University of Minnesota Farm Campus at St. Paul.

Burroughs is a native of Iowa, but spent most of his early life in Nebraska. He earned an A.B.degree at Nebraska Wesleyan University and Master's Degree from Princeton University.

He has contributed many articles to the Michigan Conservation magazine and has written technical articles for the Journal of Wildlife Management. The gems of all of his published material is the page long editorial which has appeared for many years on the inside back cover of Michigan Conservation. These embrace the homely philosophies of the composite character—yankee squire—Michigan farmer—western rancher.

He is a member of the Michigan Academy of Science, Arts and Letters, Wildlife Society, Conservation Education Association and the National Association of Conservation Education and Publicity. He has served the Historical Society of Greater Lansing as Vice-President.
