FORD S. CEASAR has been a member of the Lansing Public Schools since April, 1950. He has been a teacher at the Kalamazoo Street School and Principal of the same school for the past six years.

He was born on a farm northwest of Fowler, Michigan in Clinton County and has lived in Lansing most of his life. He graduated from Lansing Central High School in 1930 and received both his AB and MA degrees from Michigan State University. He is presently a doctoral candidate at MSU. He has done work at Central Michigan University and Ferris Institute also.

Ceasar has held several positions of leadership in education among which were president of the Lansing Education Association and president of the Horsebrook School Board of Education. He has also written articles for the Michigan Elementary Principal.

He was nominated for Lansing's outstanding citizen in 1961 by the Lansing Council of Parent-Teacher Associations and was named "Citizen of the Week" over Radio Station WJIM in March 1961.

Ceasar has been an active member of Boy Scouts serving in several capacities. He is a 25-year veteran and holds both the Eagle and Silver Beaver awards. The latter for outstanding service to boyhood and youth.
