ABOUT THE SPEAKER ...

Mr. John R. Cook, who will tell us about the role of the Michigan Department of Health since its creation in 1873, is chief of the Office of Public Health Information for the Department. Following graduation from high school in Silver Springs, Maryland in 1940, Mr. Cook served with the 835th Signal Service Battalion in the CBI theater. He earned his Master's Degree in English from the University of Michigan in 1950 and served as a teaching fellow in the English Department, 1950-51. He has served as Public Relations Director of the Michigan Tuberculosis Association, continuity writer at Station WJIM, and instructor in communication skills at Michigan State University. A two-time winner of the Avery Hopwood award for literature, Mr. Cook joined the staff of the Department in 1955.
