COL. ED MOREY AND THE CHARLOTTE CENTENNIAL

Col. Morey is to be our speaker at the Charlotte meeting and will give us a run-down on the work that community did in celebrating their Centennial along with the humorous side of history.

Col. Morey was born in Charlotte and is a descendant of a very early settler of Eaton County. He graduated from Charlotte High School in 1938 and from Michigan State College in 1942

Returning from four years of military service in Europe in 1946, he became purchasing agent for Wilcox Gay Radio Company until 1951, when he was recalled to duty. He was assigned to the University of Cincinnati as instructor in Military Science where he served for two years. He then went to Korea and served one year where he was assigned to an educational center for the Army. He returned to Charlotte and established the Morey Insurance Agency.

His wife is the former Grace Mohre and they have three sons. He was chairman of the CHARLOTTE CENTENNIAL.

KNAGGS' BRIDGE DEDICATION--September 15,1963

Over a thousand persons gathered on this bright fall Sunday afternoon, three miles east of Bancroft to dedicate the spot and reaffirm its pride of heritage. This is where our history begins—the grass roots. The young people of the area who participated—the Boy Scouts, 4-H groups and the Durand Band—were pleasant—ly exposed to their own history.

Whitmore Knaggs or Ish-dash-eman as the Indians called him, arrived at this spot about 147 years ago. He was an early pioneer, Indian agent and Interpreter for the United States Government and worked with the Indians of the area in the early days of the Territory. Many of his descendants were at the dedication to share the honor of this man. Lewis Cass in letters of the time said that without the aid of these Indian agents and interpreters that the work of establishing peace and territorial government in Michigan would have been impossible.

A group of Indians from Shepherd performed a pow-pow. Chief Little Elk, led the group in singing and dancing and performed the Lord's prayer in the Indian sign language.

SHIAWASSEE COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY and the many persons and organizations who made the dedication of this historic spot in Shiawassee County possible, are to be commended.

Mary McNeely and your president, Mrs. Wallin, attended the dedication.

OUR NOVEMBER MEETING--the 13th--is to be held at the MICHIGAN STATE UNIVERSITY MUSEUM. Dave Beatty, member of the program committee has contacted the Waterloo Historical Society and they are sending a representative to tell us of the work in that area. Their work is primarily restoration work which is a big project. More details will be available at the October meeting.
