HONOR GIVEN TO PHILIP MASON

Wayne State University's archivist and associate professor of history, Dr. Philip P. Mason, has been elected a fellow in the Society of American Archivists at a recent meeting in Raleigh, N.C. The rank of fellow is bestowed upon a limited number of individuals who have distinguished themselves in archivial administration and preservation.

Dr. Mason served as state archivist for the Historical Commission, 1953-1958, and is a charter member of this Society.

BROWN SCHOOL GOES TO TOWN

Down in Barry County, near Pine Lake and three miles from Prairieville, the Brown School or North Pine Lake School (it went by both names) after sitting on one corner since the turn of the century, up and took off down the road!

The school will be set side of the Museum on the banks of Crooked Lake between Delton and Prairieville where it will be furnished as it was in the olden days.

Oh, if the old school could just talk! Many a kid, no doubt, has had his britches warmed back in the days of the "old hickory stick."

When the Brown School District consolidated with the Delton School, ownership of the land revered back to the farm it had always set on. The Owner, Lloyd Lindsay, acquired the building and presented it to the Berrard Historical Museum. They started to move it the morning of October 1 and it was some job with the telephone and light companies both going ahead and letting down the wires.--by H.D.Burpee, Delton.

THE WATERLOO AREA HISTORICAL SOCIETY under the leadership of Mrs. Sidney Beckwith of Stockbridge, who is its president, can point with a great deal of pride to the restoration of two of the areas landmarks. The "Dewey School" on Willmore and Territorial Roads near Stockbridge is described as a "typical one-room country school. The original building was put up before 1850.

In addition to the restoration of the school the Society is currently completing restoration of the "Old Realy Home" at Munith-Waterloo Road, in the same area. It is a typical rural home of the 1840's.

The Waterloo Area Historical Society has a total of 140 members and a junior division of 16 youngsters.

NEIGHBORING HISTORICAL SOCIETY TO MEET

The Shiawassee County Historical Society will meet October 25 at 6:30 pm at the Extension Hall, Corunna. On this date the temporary officers will be replaced by a six member board, committees will be formed and after a lapse of over sixty years an historical society will be actively functioning in the County. The parent society, which met initially in 1873, ceased to exist. Membership then required that one be a resident of Michigan prior to January 1, 1845.

The first project of this new society was the erection and dedication of the first official historical marker in the county at Knaggs Bridge.

During the summer designated members have investigated possibilities of acquiring a museum and probability of restoring of the Comstock Cabin in Bentley Park.
