The Historical Society of Greater Lansing held its March meeting at the Michigan State Library with Mrs. Edith Jameson chairman for the evening. Miss Jo Anne Jackson, also of the Library, discussed some of the new acquisitions.

Special guests for the evening were Ford Ceasar's Lansing History Class and the Genealogy Class of the Y.W.C.A.

President Rajee Tobia announced that we had received support for our stand on the restoration of particular areas of the Capitol that are historically or architecturally significant from several state newspapers, historical societies, etc. A letter from Bill Alderfer, Director, Historical Society of Michigan, suggested that our Society push for legislation.

John Symonds, a member of our local Society, discussed the research and experiences that he and Mrs. Symonds had had in their search for ancestors. He said that without the State Library his search would have been impossible. He pointed out his use of census, Civil War, and death records, the Archives in Washington. D.C., and county histories. Sage advice was given us: "If you are going to hire someone to search records for you, tell everything, otherwise your own research will be duplicated . . . If you don't know what to do first, ask someone who does. " Mr. Symonds complimented the D.A.R. for its work in compiling the fine records which are available. Health Departments, cemetaries, and an endless number of letters to relatives and old-timers are other sources used in the Symonds' hunt. Throughout his talk, Mr. Symonds frequently mentioned the help he had received from Mrs. Symonds, who, in her own right, is a real genealogist also.
