MEET YOUR PRESIDENT-JACK T. CROSBY

Jack was born in Detroit, October 1, 1911. He came to Lansing in 1913, and attended Walnut Street School, Michigan Avenue School, West Junior and graduated from Central in 1929. He studied electrical engineering with ICS. He was Secretary and President of the Hi-Y and worked on the Oracle Board.

As a boy of 12 he started working with his father in the marble and tile business of A. D. Crosby, Inc. The depression ended that business and he said he had held a million jobs until he started with the Board of Water and Light in 1935, where he worked in both the office and power plant until 1946. He then went with the Michigan Public Service as a public utility engineer until 1948 when he went to work with Hebblewhite's doing ceramic tile work. In January 1959 to the present he has had his own ceramic tile business.

The Crosbys like to travel and have visited 45 states and 9 foreign countries including Europe. They are especially interested in state capitols, the presidents of our Country, their birth places, homes and graves. They visit cemeteries, historic sites and museums.

Hobbies are collecting: Stamps, stamps with maps on them, covers of Michigan flag cancellations and Lansing covers. Also old maps, historic knickknacks, political items, history and travel books, making scrapbooks of historic Lansing and volumes of news items on friends--all cross-filed.

He is also President of Central Michigan Philatelic Society, Past President of Old Lansing Stamp Club from 1934 until it went out of existance. He is a life member and twice on the Board of Vice Presidents of Peninsular State Philatelic Society.

He is a member of the Flag Cancel Society, the American Society of Polar Philatelists, American Topical Association and the United States Capital History Society, all national organizations. He is a member of the Historical Society of Michigan and the Historical Society of Greater Lansing, this year holding the presidency of that organization. (over)
