Centennial of Woman's Hospital Association

One hundred years ago, in 1896, several prominent women from Lansing formed the Woman's Hospital Association and opened the first hospital in the area. After that, extremely ill people could be cared for in a hospital by trained nurses. The original "hospital" was a house at 310 W. Ottawa Street. Within a few years more space was needed, and in 1899 the hospital moved to the beautiful old James Mead house on N. Cedar.

In 1910, Edward W. Sparrow donated land and \$100,000 to the Woman's Hospital Association to build a hospital building. It has been expanded many times since then, but part of the original building can still be seen on E. Michigan Avenue.

E. W. Sparrow was an Irish immigrant (b. 1846) who came to Lansing in 1858 and became a major Lansing businessman and investor. He was one of the founders of the Lansing Improvement Co., formed in 1873, which promoted the city as a busi-

ness capital; President of Lansing Wheelbarrow Co.; and founder of City National Bank in 1886. He had close ties with R. E. Olds and was first president of Olds' Motor Vehicle Co., 1897. He owned land in five states, Canada, and Brazil.

His interest in hospitals came from the unfortunate death of his first wife, Helen Grant, in 1899, after the birth of their son. Helen's mother was one of the charter members of the Woman's Hospital Association. The Edward W. Sparrow Hospital opened in 1912, but Sparrow, who had been living in New York City, died

the next year without ever seeing it.

Jean Frazier's program will focus on several crises that impacted the hospital, including the Kern's Hotel fire (1934); the birth of the Morlock quadruplets (1930), all still living; and the Bath School disaster (1927), the worst premeditated disaster in the United States until the recent bombing in Oklahoma City. For 100 years, a Woman's Board of Managers has been part of the administration of the hospitals.
