
Lansing: Michigan's Capital for 150 YEARS!

Program, March 20 7:00 p.m., Capitol Building

On March 16, 1847, Governor Greenly signed the legislation that would relocate the Capital of Michigan, then in Detroit, to a wilderness in mid-Michigan known only as Lansing Township. Advocates of other locations, such as Owosso and Calumet and Marshall, howled; land speculators, especially James Seymour and William Townsend who already owned land here, smiled; legislators shook their heads.

This was a land of woods and swamps, with a few Native Americans led by Chief Okemos, a small young settlement at the dam (North Lansing), and a population two years earlier in the entire township of only 88 people.

When the site was selected, in the block bounded by Washington and Capitol on the east and west, and by Allegan and Washtenaw on the north and south, there was no town around it. An entire town had to be created to be the capital city: "Michigan," Michigan was platted immediately, the land was cleared, stores and liveries and hotels and a post office were set up, and the race was on.

• Lansing Public Library. As you know from the newspapers, in December 1997, the Library will be separated from its funding source, the Lansing Public Schools; proposals for a new district library are underway. We have many concerns about the Local History Collections housed at the Library.

• Scarch for Old Families in Family History Project. We have received about 35 applications for the family history awards. What a delight they are to read! Rick Cantwell volunteered to computerize all of the information, and he has produced family trees and indexed over 900 names. All of the families have been invited to the Gala Opening of the Sesquicentennial, and the oldest three or four families will be featured on display boards that night.

We now are contacting known "old families" from whom we have not heard.

At the Annual Dinner on May 22, recognition will given by Mayor David Hollister to families who have lived here for 100 and 125 years, and special recognition will go to families who have lived here 150 years and more.


