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

Nearly two years ago, a scrap book was donated to the Society. Its contents are rich in the work of artist, photographer and Lansing merchant Charles H. Mead dating from the late 1870's to the turn of the century. Below is the beginning of an adventure involving Mead during 1889 recorded in his own words and drawings as published in the Lansing Republican.

Enchanting Trip.

READ IT IN THE REPUBLICAN TO-MORROW.

Chas. H. Mead's Inimitable Sketches of Grand River - The Boat Pirates' Capture.

Mr. C.H. Mead and party arrived home on Friday, after a most enjoyable trip on (the) Grand River from Lansing to Grand Rapids, and THE REPUBLICAN will commence tomorrow a series of illustrated sketches of the voyage, written in Mr. Mead's own racy style, and illustrated by himself.

The trip was exceedingly pleasant and was only marred by the circumstance of the arrest at Portland, previously reported. To Lansing people, who had known the members of the party for years, as among the best citizens, this brilliant (?) movement of our law officers presented only a ludicrous or ridiculous face;

but to Mr. Mead, who was not only subjected to inconvenience, but to wholly needless bill of costs, the proceedings wore a different aspect. He regards them as a cold-blooded attempt to "bleed" him, in the face of fact that the old skiff was almost worthless, and they tried in vain to find an owner for it, for several days, and believed it abandoned. His account of the capture of the "boat pirates," single-handed, by the valiant officer is rich and will be read with pleasure by all. Look for it. (The Republican, August, 1889)

CRUISE OF THE SARAH BERNHARDT

HE aggregate of 145 years, divided according to accident of birth between five people, concluding that Lansing city atmosphere was too much adulterated for the purposed of good health, resolved on a voyage down the raging Grand

- to be continued until weariness, or the great lake, was achieved.

A clinker boat and a canvass canoe were ready at hand, but some sort of a baggage van was required, and this the younger part of the aggregation were delegated to procure. Instructed by the elders to be sure that no cloud should rest on the title to whatever craft they could get, they made inquiry among the boys and men who used an old veteran scow, water-soaked and badly banged, as to its owner. No one seemed to know, neither did the occupants of several houses where inquiry was made. The boat seemed to be an orphan in need of adoption, and that is the way we stole that boat.

An afternoon sun filtered through the fringe of foliage on the river bank where our party finally embarked, and with whistle and song and laughter and empty stomachs floated down through rapids, ripples and reptiles, amidst islands, and more or less magnificent scenery, until hunger and the head of the Delta dam made it convenient to draw up under the overhanging boughs of the trees and lunch.

Passing Delta dam, with idle machinery at either end of it, we picked our way among boulders and shoals, ripples and rapids, until lengthening shadows, a convenient spring, and table conveniences with picnic characteristics induced us to pitch our tent, about three miles above Grand Ledge. A wall

tent about 10 feet square afforded ample room for our baggage, etcetera, and before morning we also found that there



was room for 14,000,000 mosquitoes of the variety which frequent picnic grounds. You can always tell that kind of mosquito. They have a business directness of purpose and promptness in getting their little auger at work, that distinguishes them from every other variety.

Boiled ham, hot coffee, and bread and butter was the bill of fare for supper. For breakfast we had cold boiled ham and some other things. There are a million or more reasons why that first camp is not pleasant to think of. There was a beautiful spring of water flowing out from under a big tree - the only thing we wouldn't forget.

Sliding our fleet over the Grand Ledge dam, we were soon in the gorge among the beautifully wooded islands which affords the principal charm of this popular resort. The numerous attractions of a well-stocked picnic detained us until late in the afternoon. Pulling out in the edge of the evening

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is a thing no veteran campers would do; but amateurs like us are expected to do just such foolish things. The dam below the picnic grounds, though of less fall than any other we encountered, was to us more difficult, but was only a forerunner of the tribulations attending the next stage of our

The bed of the river here was evidently the track of a former glacier some years since - say a million or so. Boulders from the size of a small house to a grain of sand abounded, between, around and over which flowed the river. To pick a channel with the stones and gravel far enough from the bottom of our boats to admit of our passing, was a piece of fine art which none of us accomplished. Boating was simply horrible, and so was walking; but that was what we had to do. Descriptions of shooting the rapids were vivid in our minds; but mentally we said "Shoot the rapids." Darkness found us still in the midst of tribulation and stones. Should like to say something about the scenery - about the fish, and the clear, pure air. We were conscious of a sun-bath, and we have impressions of overhanging trees, etc. The fish were there, gliding about us, smiling as we sailed. We declined to take any. A fine boiled ham, and a ham to broil with etcetera, seemed to discourage fishing just then....
