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



Lansing Automotive History with Dave Pfaff

Hill Diesel Engine Company

Hill Diesel Company had its origins in Lansing with the Bates and Edmonds Motor Company, founded in 1899 by Madison Bates and James Edmonds. Madison Bates previously worked at P.F. Olds and Sons where he and R.E. Olds developed the Olds gasoline internal

combustion engine. He held several engine and auto related patents, some in partner with R.E. Olds. James Edmonds handled the financial end of the business. After years of successfully producing the "Bull Dog" and "Bull Pup" stationary gasoline engines (and an unsuccessful foray into the automobile business with the Bates auto), Bates and Edmonds Company began experimenting with an oil engine in 1911. The early oil engines were designed to run on low grade fuel but were not true diesels. They were higher compression then contemporary gasoline engines, but still had igniters, not the compression ignition of a true diesel. They started development of their true diesel in 1925. The early oil engines and diesels were used for applications such as air compressors, electric generators, hoists, and pumps. The Bates and Edmond diesel engines were available in 10 to 140 horsepower, with a V8 of 240 horsepower. They were also used in marine applications where they were superior to gasoline engines because of their better fuel economy (cost per hour) and the fact that the lower grade fuel was much less volatile than gasoline and therefore a lesser explosion hazard in a confined boat hull.

Mr. Edmonds' interest in the engine operation was purchased by R.E. Olds in 1929 and renamed Hill Diesel Company, with the operation continuing at the former Bates and Edmonds factory on Mill Street. The name came from H.D. Hill who became General Manager of Bates and Edmonds in 1910 upon the retirement of Madison Bates.

These engines were exported to Europe in large volumes. In 1930, Mr. Hill stated "...its (Hill's) products are better known in foreign lands than in Lansing," when at that time over 1000 Hill Diesels were in France and also in North Africa, China and Siam.

In 1930, R.E. Olds converted a REO Speed Wagon truck to use a Hill Diesel and made a delivery of a Hill engine-generator to New York City in an

"...its (Hill's) products are better known in foreign lands than in Lansing," attempt to interest REO Motors in buying the Company (or engines). The total fuel cost,

round trip, was \$3.72 for 959 miles.

The Hill Diesel was widely used as an auxiliary power plant for the huge ocean-going diesels. Thirty-five were in operation at the Suez Canal for various func-tions, and were used for the lighting plant on Mount Saint Michael off the coast of France. Hundreds were used in the U.S. Navy and Coast Guard. Others were used on private yachts; as electrical generators; at light houses and at the Panama Canal. During World War II, 6,000 were made for generators with the factory running 24 hours a day, employing 550, to meet demand. Diesels were also made at the *Ideal Engine Company* (also owned by R.E. Olds) for a time and called Factory #2.


Hill Diesel Engine Company, continued,

Mr. Olds used a three cylinder, 30 horsepower, Hill Diesel for the generator on his personal 93 foot yacht, the "Reomar", as well as twin six cylinder Hill Diesels for the main engines.

In 1941 Hill was sold to Rogers Diesel and Aircraft

Corporation of New York and was merged with Indian Motorcycle Company in 1947, another Rogers' company. At the time, Hill was building 2, 4, and 6 cylinder engines. In 1953 the operations, employing about 150 workers, were moved to Providence, Rhode Island where production continued with generator units for the military.

A portion of the Bates and Edmonds Mill Street factory survives as the conference room of the R.E. Olds Transportation Museum while the Ideal Engine Company factory, renamed in 1924 the *Ideal Power Lawn Mover Company*,

still exists at 704 E. Kalamazoo Street, now used by Armstrong Pool.

There are four Hill Diesel engines on permanent display at the Michigan Steam Engine and Threshers Club in Mason, Michigan, and are run during their annual show each July, generating electricity.
