History of Hospitals and Healthcare in Lansing By Mary Jane Wilson and Karen Douglas Thursday, October 17, 2013 - 7:00 pm Downtown Library, 401 South Capitol Avenue, Lansing

Health Care in 1844 Lansing was limited to home remedies, a few 'doctors' and one hospital, the Ingham County Poor Farm, where nobody wanted to go. It was not until 1889 that Lansing would see its first city hospital. Though short lived, this hospital paved the way for the beginnings of the Sparrow Hospital we know today, founded in 1896 by a group of dedicated, community-minded, and capable women of the city.

While Sparrow Hospital was one of the first major hospitals to be established in Lansing, it was preceded by another healthcare institution in the late 1880s known as 'The Pest House,' a building for those afflicted with a communicable disease such as smallpox. Within a few years, the Ingham County Tuberculosis Sanitorium was born, followed by St. Lawrence Hospital, Neller Hospital, McLaughlin Osteopathic Hospital, Lansing General Osteopathic Hospital and, most recently, McLaren Greater Lansing. Karen and Mary Jane will unravel Lansing's complicated medical history, charting a course from the mid 19th century to the turn of the 21st century. Please plan to join us!

Going with the Flow...The Lansing Board of Water and Light's John Dye Water Conditioning Plant By Mr. Steve Bohnet, Partner, Bohnet Electric Co.

When it comes to vital resources, water rates a very close second to the air that we breathe. The value of excellent quality water is virtually priceless. No one knows and appreciates this more than the staff of the Lansing Board of Water and Light's John Dye Water Conditioning Plant located at 148 S. Cedar St. in Lansing, Michigan. The water treatment plant is named after John Dye, a chemist for the LBWL. The plant was designed by architect Kenneth and Lee Black. Its construction began in 1938 as a WPA (Works Progress Administration) project, and was completed and opened in 1939. In keeping with



the edicts of the WPA, a 32 foot tall sculpture the Greek water bearer, "Aquarius", created by Samuel Cashwan, head of the WPA Sculpture Section in Michigan, extends out of the edifice over the copper double doors. It was intended to symbolize the distribution of conditioned water by the chemical retort on the right shoulder through the pump in the left hand to the populace at the feet of Aquarius.

The doors open to a beautifully appointed staircase that surrounds a ceramic blue fountain, "Water Nymphs," sculpted by Clivia Calder, Ceramic Supervisor for the WPA in Michigan. The lower walls are flanked by artificial stone wall panels made of lime and shale called 'Rostone.' Invented in 1927, this material was toured at the 1933



Chicago World's Fair. The upper portion of the lobby walls are wrapped in outstanding color murals that were painted by Frank Cassara, Supervisor of Easel Painting for the WPA in Michigan. The murals on the north side of the building depict flooding and the destructive forces of water. The murals on the south side of the lobby depict the benefits of water: health, cleanliness, and recreation. Cassara, at age 75, returned after 50 years, in 1989 to



'touch up' and restore color to his murals. A third mural on the back wall was painted by Charles Pollack, the Supervisor for Mural Painting and Graphic Arts for the WPA in Michigan. This mural painted in 1941 depicts Man's control over nature and the importance of water as Hydro-Electric Power. Dramatic backlighting bidden at the edge of the trayed ceiling gives an ethereal glow to this breathtaking space. The incredibly interesting aspect of all of this artistry is that it was created all for the workers, not the public. The WPA's mission was to create beauty in the workplace to inspire pride and a good work ethic among the workers.

After climbing to the top of the grand staircase a look to the left through the double glass doors reveals the Filter Gallery. As you enter the cool, humid hall, a long expanse of polished terrazzo floor stretches out for what seems to be forever. Your eye is drawn upward along the concrete columns to miles of glass block capped by a coffered, cast concrete, vaulted ceiling. Nine polished aluminum Art Deco light fixtures illuminate this water cathedral. Surrounding this hall are giant square water Although now the filter process is filter tanks. computerized, the gallery still features all the original aluminum and bakelite consoles. These consoles were

designed to replicate the look of the grill of the 1937 Oldsmobile two-door touring sedan. In the event of a computer failure the consoles can still be used to operate this gallery. The control handles are actual door h a n d l e s from Oldsmobiles of that era.
