Jim Harrison Exhibit Friends

The Library of Michigan and the Historical Society of Greater Lansing is hosting an exhibit on the life and work of celebrated author Jim Harrison, a graduate of Haslett High School and Michigan State University. Harrison is the author of more than 60 poetry collections, novellas, and fiction and non-fiction books. Several of his books have been made into movies, including *Legends of the Fall* starring Brad Pitt.

The exhibit, *Friends*, is built around 35 photographs of Harrison taken in 1969 by his close friend John "Bud" Schulz of St. Johns, Michigan. The photos present an intimate look at a young Harrison with family and friends. Mostly taken at the Harrison farm in Leland, one of the photographs of the writer posed against a hose is cited as helping create the author's legend. Harrison was noted for writing that revolved around family, love, food, wine, human emotions, the environment, and the classic underdog. *The New Yorker* magazine once labeled him the "Mozart of the Prairie." In addition to the photographs, the exhibit will showcase his broadsides, writing desk, examples of his early work, letters, artwork from his writing studio, and personal mementos from his life.

We Hope for Better Things

History isn't just full of stories, it is stories. Add up all the individual stories of individual lives in individual situations, and you have history. Not just what happened when and where, but to whom and why. The old paintings and the black-andwhite photos of our history textbooks come alive when we let ourselves step into the shoes of real people who were there. Or even fictional people who were there! Period TV shows and movies and historical fiction seem to be having a moment in our culture. Do we simply long to escape to a simpler time with fancier clothes? Or could it be that we are realizing that the past is both a key to understanding the present and a warning as we move into the future?

Join local author Erin Bartels as she explains why her debut novel was steeped in history—a difficult, ugly part of U.S. history—because she was trying to process the present. She'll talk about how she handled researching a novel that swings between three distinct time periods—the 1860s, the 1960s, and present day—in Detroit, a city that is simultaneously Michigan's greatest achievement, its biggest disappointment, and hopefully its most exciting comeback story. And she'll invite discussion about historical fiction as a genre—what authors do right, what they do wrong, and how one person's interpretation of past events should always be a starting point to understanding history, not the end point.

A List of Lansing Fire Stations

Sometimes it can be surprisingly hard to figure out exactly when some event took place, or when a particular building was built. This information is critical to understanding and teaching history—but it can be tough to locate. The discovery of a good list can make historical research much easier, and can tell its own compelling story of growth and decline.

Longtime HSGL member Timothy Bowman has dedicated many years of his life to researching and compiling lists of Lansing area institutions, including businesses, theatres, and events. He uses a number of tools to source his facts, including various historical iterations of the Lansing State Journal, Lansing city directories, and other historical sources found in the Capital Area District Library's Forest Parke Library and Archives.

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Fire Station No. 1

1857, October 5 - Torrent Engine Co. No. 1 is organized. (SJ 10-16-1911)

1872, June 11 – Regular city fire department organized under the control of the common council. (SJ 10-16-1911)

1895, September – Photo of fire department under city hall quarters at 112 E. Allegan St. (SH 4-28-1955)

1905, February 6 – Moves from Allegan St. across the street to S. Grand Ave. (LJ 2-4-1905)

1915, 1927, 1940 City Directories - 125 S. Grand Ave. at E. Allegan Street. The South Grand Parking Ramp is on the spot today.
