This book is an attempt to list items which served as money or as a form of near-money in the cities of Lansing & East Lansing, as well as the Lake Lansing (Haslett) area. Items included in these listings either have a stated face value or are of a nature which makes their near-money use generally well known. Included are listings for Lansing & East Lansing merchant & fraternal tokens, amusement tokens, centennial tokens, civil war tokens, encased cents, parking tokens, transportation tokens, national currency, early scrip, obsolete banknotes & depression scrip.

Items not listed in this book include non-Lansing items, items without a specific face value, tokens of questionable attribution to Lansing, and items which were not used or intended as money or a money substitute. Specifically not included are masonic pennies, medals, wooden nickels without a specific face value, and tokens without the word Lansing on them that cannot be reasonably attributed to the cities listed above. Only general circulation paper money is listed, with coupons resembling money, advertising notes, checks and other noncirculating forms of paper money specifically not included.

The completeness of the various sections of this book will vary considerably. Some topics have already been extensively catalogued, including civil war tokens, transportation tokens, parking tokens, depression scrip, and national currency. New discoveries on these items are few and far between, with the exception of new issues. Lansing merchant & fraternal tokens represent perhaps the weakest link in the listings, as only 387 of the 500 (or more) tokens believed to be out there are listed here. As time goes on, hopefully the listings will become more complete, as the author will endeavor to research and list any new reports in supplements or a future edition of this book. This second edition contains about 50% more listings than were contained in the first edition!

This book will never be complete, as new tokens will be issued and new varieties are always out there waiting to be discovered. Part of the fun of collecting Lansing tokens and paper money is that the collection can never be completed, as there is always one more piece just waiting for you at the local antique shop, flea market, coin dealer, or coin show. That little box of trinkets in Grandma's attic may have the item you always dreamed about for your collection. The thrill of the hunt has kept me going in search for new Lansing area items for my own collection, which at the present time has only about 85% of the items listed in this book.



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LANSING MERCHANT & FRATERNAL TOKENS

The widespread use of tokens by merchants and fraternal organizations in Lansing began about 1900, with a variety of issuers producing tokens for their businesses. The tokens constituted a form of local money, and the issuers of the tokens were almost as varied as the tokens themselves.

The early tokens of Lansing (ca. 1860-1910) were prisarily of brass and copper. Aluminum tokens first appeared about 1896, and were to become more popular than brass from about 1910 to 1935. Brass took over again as the primary token material by about 1935, as aluminum was considered a "cheap" material by then. Plastic tokens appeared on the Lansing scene about 1940, as plastic was considered the new "miracle material" at that time. With the wartime shortages of materials the use of zinc and fiber tokens began, with the issues being rather short lived, as the zinc tokens corroded rather quickly and the cardboard wore out too quickly. Brass again became the dominant metal by the late 1940's, with most tokens of the 1940's and 1950's composed of this material. with the 1970's and 1980's has come more extensive use of cheaper materials and production techniques in the production of tokens, with wood and plastic being the dominant materials.

Several types of businesses used tokens on an extensive basis, as the nature of the business made the use of tokens a sensible idea. Some of the following businesses used tokens rather extensively:

<u>Cigar Stores</u> used tokens to give the customer a break on the price of cigars, and to keep the customer coming back. Before the 1930's cigars did not come individually wrapped, and were apt to become stale rather quickly if not kept in a humidor. The customer who wanted a few fresh cigars could give the proprietor a few tokens, which were usually purchased by the customer at a slight discount from face value in quantity. This insured the proprietor of a guaranteed prepaid sale and the customer of a slight discount on the price.

Card Rooms used tokens extensively as an alternative to open gambling. Tokens were issued, usually good for xg in trade or xg in merchandise, which could be redeemed for food, drinks, clgars, or other merchandise. The "golden age" of the card room in Lansing seems to be from the 1930's through 1950's.

Dairies often used tokens to give the customer a way to both order and pay for milk and dairy products. Tokens were used by customers as a sort of order ticket and prepayment for their dairy products. A customer could put two one quart tokens in their milkbox (this was in the days that dairies delivered) and receive two quarts of milk in exchange. Dairies also used tokens to serve as bottle return checks, as the rates at which bottles were good for when returned varied from dairy to dairy. Tokens also helped out on security, as a token left in the milk box was a far less tempting target to a thief than money!

Fraternal Organizations used tokens for many of the same reasons as other issuing companies. Tokens were used by the organizations at their clgar stands, for gambling, for food. for drink, and for many other assorted uses. Quite a variety of organizations in Lansing have issued tokens over the years. which is evidenced in the token listings themselves.

Pool Halls used tokens for payment for table time, for cigars and tobacco, for food and drink, and for gambling purposes. Gambling, although illegal per se, was often done using the tokens as stakes, with the tokens redeemable for a variety of products and services.

Saloons used tokens as a way of keeping customers drinking at their establishments rather than going from bar to bar. Drinks were commonly sold at 5¢ each, with this being the usual denomination of Lansing saloon tokens. Tokens were sometimes (but not always) sold at a slight discount (an example of this would be the sale of 6 5¢ tokens for 25¢) thus giving the customer a little extra incentive to do all of their business at one establishment. Tokens were also used in the saloons for gambling. for pool table time, and for food and cigars. After prohibition the use of tokens was continued by many local taverns, with the tokens used for many of the same purposes.

Many of the tokens that were used in the city of Lansing bear no indication that they are really a Lansing issue. Some of these pieces, with adequate research, can be pinned down as Lansing issues. An example of this is the tokens from the GNIS-NAL GROTTO, which bear no address or city, but when read backwards will be seen to spell LAN-SING. A search of the directories turns up listings for this organization in the 1923-1929 listings, thus guaranteeing the piece to be a Lansing issue. The author has endeavored to list tokens which he feels are of at least a 90% probability of being Lansing issues. Further research is bound to turn up several more pieces in this category, and readers are asked to send listings of suspected Lansing tokens to the author for research.

Prices listed are the author's estimate of a conservative retail price on the pieces listed. The reader should be warned that as the rarities of the tokens change so will the prices. Supply and demand factors also influence the value of tokens, as the influx of even a few new serious token collectors in a given area can drive prices to astronomical levels.

Lansing merchant & fraternal tokens are listed in alphabetical order in this segment of the book. Tokens are alphabetized using the last name of the merchant, and on tokens where initials are used (such as B.P.O.E. #196) the first initial is used to determine placement in the book.

The author has endeavored to be as complete as possible in these listings, but the job of cataloging Lansing's tokens will never be finished. New varieties pop up monthly it seems, and in each new collection of Lansing items 1 see it seems that there is always something new for the listings. Maybe this helps explain why I find the collecting of Lansing exonumla so fascinating.

rirst Column: Token Letter - indicates variety of token for the particular merchant.

second Column: Diameter - indicates diameter (measured in millimeters) for the token. On oval and heart shaped tokens the right to left measurement is given first, then the up and down measurement. On octagonal and square tokens the measurement is made across the flats. On scalloped tokens the maximum width is used.

Third Column: Material - indicates substance the token is manufactured from. Some materials can be manufactured with various colors, as exemplified by plastic tokens, which can be made with a variety of colors as well as printed with other colors. On two color tokens the color of the token material is given first, then the color of the printing, both of which appear in lower case letters. On wooden money the color of the printing is given as a lower case letter. On embossed plastic tokens the color of the body material is olven as a lower case letter.



Sixth Column: Token Descriptions - these are done through the use of a slash (/) to indicate where one line on a token ends and another begins. Obverse listings end on the line preceding the token letter and specifications. Artwork on the tokens (propellors, bow ties, etc...) is drawn as faithfully as possible, and is included in the token descriptions. When different reverses are combined with the same obverse description they are listed in series following the description of the common obverse.

Seventh Column: Prices - these follow to the right of the description of the reverse of the token. Prices will vary according to supply and demand considerations, and on extremely rare items they can be somewhat speculative. Prices will vary from 50g to several hundred dollars, with the author endeavoring to try to list a conservative retail valuation on each item. Prices are based on the authors observation of sales of these items between knowledgeable dealers and collectors.

On the listing above the A to the left indicates that this is the first variety for this particular merchant. Following this is the number 25 Indicating that the token is 25mm in width. After this follows Pwe indicating that the token is white plastic with black lettering. Q indicates the shape, which in this instance is square. 7 is the rarity number, which indicates that for this particular token only 1 piece is known to the author. The \$7.00 figure at the far right is the authors estimate of a conservative retail value on the piece.

John H. Callahan first appears in the 1902 city directory as the proprietor of the Cadillac Saloon, which is listed through the 1904 directory. Callahan later joined up with Fred C. Wilder, and is listed in the 1906 directory with Wilder as an agent for the Pabst Brewing Company, with the partnership listed as bottlers and deliverers of Pabst Blue Ribbon beer. They opened a sample room by the time the 1908 directory came out, with the address listed as 331 South Washington Avenue, with this listing lasting through the 1910 city directory. John Callahan later opened his own "retail liquor store" at 503 East Michigan Avenue, which appears in the 1912-13 city directories. The Location at 503 E. Michigan became a pool room by 1915.

1000 CAPITAL NATIONAL BANK (1906-30)

The Capital National Bank was one of the many business enterprises of Lansing auto pioneer Ransom E. Olds. It was chartered in 1906, and operated until 1934, when the great depression forced it to close its doors. The address listed on the token (corner Washington & Allegan) dates the token as being from 1906-30, before the move to the Olds tower (124 W. Allegan St. - now the Michigan National tower) in 1931. The bank also issued national currency, which is listed in the currency section of this book.

James N. Sepeter's Club Tally-Ho first appears in the 1937 city directory, with the address listed as 1151-1172 East Michigan Avenue. According to the Lansing State Journal of February 8, 1976 the "official" membership limit of this private club was 500, but the actual number of members was closer to 1500. Membership in the club was in the \$10-12 range per year. Club Tally-Mo had a restaurant on the first floor (seafood), the bar and club rooms on the second floor, and the slot machines on the third floor (which provided a little excitement each time they were raided, as slots were illegal at the time).

The Downey Hotel traces its roots back to 1866 when it was built by Colonel Lafayette C. Baker using part of the reward money received from the capture of John Wilkes Booth, with the original name of the hotel being the Lansing House. Henry J. Downey purchased the hotel in 1889, and with this purchase the name of the hotel was changed to the Downey. The hotel was very fancy for its time, especially after it was enlarged and expanded by two stories in 1907 by Charles Downey, and it included a convention hall on the sixth floor, a grill room in connection, and a sample room. The Downey was gutted by fire on February 6, 1912, after which it was rapidly rebuilt, with the life of the hotel to continue until 1936, when it was torn down to make room for the new J.W. Knapp department store, also at 300-08 South Washington Avenue. 2200A was probably issued before the fire of 1912, as the piece in my collection exhibits some fire damage, possibly as a result of the 1912 fire.



THE PORTER (1917-60) 8003

The Porter (hotel, apartments, and restaurant) was built in 1917 under Edgar Seth Porter, who was its founder and first president. The address is listed in the directories as 501 Townsend, very near the Capitol building in downtown Lansing. The hotel and apartments were very fancy for their time, with many a local politician favoring these for their accomodations. In the 1940's the hotel was converted for the most part to apartments, and in 1961 the business was sold and renamed the Capital Park Motor Hotel. The exact reason for the issuance of such an unusual denomination (6¢) on the token is not presently known to me.

The Johns family still owns and operates Pro-Bowl, with locations listed in Lansing and East Lansing in the 1991 telephone directory. Pro-Bowl also issued tokens for the Bus-Stop Nite Club/ Pro-Bowl in East Lansing; see East Lansing 650 A-D for listings.

Sparrow, famed Lansing banker, industrialist, and investor, opened around 1912 at 1215 East Michigan Avenue, about a mile east of the capitol building. The hospital has grown considerably, and it now has over a 500 bed capacity. The "radio token" listed below is similar to those of the McLaughlin Osteopathic Hospital (#6550) and St. Lawrence Hospital (#8800). They were produced by the Osborne Register Company, and were shipped in 50 piece rolls to the hospital by that company. At present a hoard of 3000 pieces, mostly in original 50 coin rolls hangs over the market, so don't pay too much for these!







LANSING MERCHANT TOKENS SUPPLEMENTAL LISTINGS

The following listings are the tokens of which listings were received too late for insertation into the regular text. Many of the pieces listed came from a rather large (1700 tokens) hoard of tokens which was purchased by Liberty Coins in April of 1992, about three months after the main body of the Lansing merchant token listings were typed up. This hoard, which I will refer to as the "slot" hoard, apparently all came from an old slot machine (or machines) and was found in the walls of a house that was torn down in Lansing in 1992.

The "slot" hoard contained about 1500 numbered slot machine tokens, mostly holed, as well as about 200 tokens with either merchant name, or merchant name and city and state. The vast majority of the tokens in the group were readily attributable to the Greater Lansing area, with Lansing, Grand Ledge, and Williamston being the three largest cities in terms of token population. Also represented was Detroit, with about 10 tokens, Coleman, Mich, with about 15 pieces, and Grand Rapids, Flint, and Saginaw with a few pieces each. The vast bulk of the attributed pieces came from Michigan, with about 25 pieces from the deal being from out of state.

In the group there were about 70 different "maverick" trade tokens which did not indicate city and state on the piece. About 25 of these were already attributed to various locations in the greater Lansing area, leaving about 45 pieces which were not immediately attributable. Of those 45 pieces, close to 20 were later found to be from Lansing, with virtually all of the pieces being issued 1927 and earlier. The collection provided me with a virtual "time capsule" of tokens, with that 1927 date being very useful in attributing additional pleces. Many of the listings here are ones which would have been impossible had this group not come in intact, as they for the most part are attributable based on "circumstantial evidence".

The following pieces constitute the presently known additions to the earlier listings. More tokens are sure to follow.

The following token is more properly classified as a "non-local" Michigan token than a Lansing issue, but since it includes Lansing in the locations it was good, I guess I'll include It in the listings. The Holly Lansing Grill appears in the 1958-69 city directorles at 104 S. Washington Avenue. The 1958 city directory advertisement states: Holly Lansing Grill, William W. Curr, Mgt, good food since 1924. step out, dine out, friendly service always. Holly's Steak & Four was located at 600 N. Homer Street from 1970 to 1981, then closed after that date. It is my opinion that the below listed token was probably issued while Holly's had the downtown location.

LANSING AMUSEMENT TOKENS

Amusement Lokens have been used throughout the years in Lensing, starting with the slot machine, jukebox, pinball, and nearly arcade tokens and continuing in use to this day, with some video arcades still using tokens.

Early Lansing amusement tokens included slot machine, tykebox, pinball, and penny arcade tokens. Unfortunately most of these tokens were not issued with anything to indicate their place of origin, with many of the tokens simply bearing a number and the face value. Other tokens bear a face value and the name of the merchant but give no indication that they are intended for amusement only. These tokens are listed in section 1 of the book under the Lansing merchant Loken listings. Only one early Lansing token cualifies for inclusion in these listings, with this Loken being the penny arcade token issued by the vaudette Theatre.

with the new video game boom there has also come a boom in video arcade tokens. Unfortunately only one issuer has put out a token which is specifically attributable to Lansing, with that issuer being Mark's Arc., Several other video arcades in Larsing have issued tokens, including Meijers Thrifty Acres, Gunball Express, Sears, Chuck E. Cheese, and others. Unfortunately, none of the tokens from these establishments are distinctively Lansing in origin, with most of these organizations choosing to Issue the so-called "stock" token, which is used in multiple locations, thus making the attribution to Lansing or anywhere else virtually impossible.

with the decline in the video game boom it is starting to appear that additional issues in the next few years is not terribly likely. Most establishments catering to pinball and video game fanciers have switched over to using American coins instead of tokens.

A100 MARK'S ARC (1982-1985) Mark's Arc (arcade) first appears in the 1982 city directory at 820 West Miller Road, with Mark Rueben listed as proprietor of this video arcade. Mark's Arc is listed at 3620 S. Waverly Road in the 1984-85 telephone directory. The name of the establishment changed to Logan Square amusements in 1985, with token use discontinued at this point,

LANSING CENTENNIAL TOKENS (1959)

The city of Lansing was incorporated on February 15, 1859, and was justifiably proud of its 100th anniversary which it celebrated in the late spring of 1959. The city held its centennial celebration from May 24 to June 28, 1959, and as a part of this celebration issued tokens which were good for 50g in trede at stores in Lansing and East Lansing, or redeemable at banks in Lansing and East Lansing. The tokens were redeemable through June 17, 1959, eleven days before the end of the centennial

Lansing's centennial tokens depict the new city hall, built between February 1955 and May 1958 at a cost of 4.5 million dollars. Next to the illustration of the new city hall is a much smaller log cabin, symbolic of Lansing's pioneer heritage; Lansing has been nicknamed the "city in the forest" by local author Burt Darling because of its selection as the new state capital in 1847 when most of the land around the city had yet to even be cleared, let alone settled. The mottos on the token "proud of the past" and "confident of the future" need not be

Lansing centennial tokens come in three varieties, made with a total of two obverse and two reverse dies. The obverse dies are quite similar, but can be differentiated by the size of the dates and by where the A in LANSING points. On the first die the A in LANSING points directly to the P in PROUD, with the dates in small numbers; on the second die the A points just to the left of the P and the date digits are larger. The first die broke after striking approximately one third of the tokens needed for the celebration, with the second obverse die created to replace the first. Unfortunately, the time that it took to cut the second reverse die made the tokens arrive too late to be sold out by the end of the celebration. The second obverse die was also mated with a second reverse die bearing the inscription YOUNG AMERICA DAY AWARD and was used for making award medals for Young America Day, held on June 23, 1959.

The Lansing centennial tokens were used to help finance the centennial celebration, with an issue of over 100,000 pieces created, according to A. Dean Watkins of Lansing, who was responsible for the creation of the issue. Watkins recalls the problems with die breakage on the first die and the delay in production on the second die, but has no knowledge of the production of the Young America Day Award tokens. He states that the chamber of commerce gave out the remaining tokens over a several year period as an inducement to bring new business and

Lansing's centennial tokens are by far the most easily obtainable of the tokens issued in the city of Lansing. Literally thousands of these tokens are available, with approximately 1/3 of these being number C100A, the combination of the first obverse and the first reverse die. Approximately 2/3 of the Lansing centennial tokens are #C1008, the combination of the second obverse and first reverse dies. The Young America Day reverse die has only 3 specimens known to collectors, with this

die being mated to the second obverse die. The only known specimens of this taken were found in the taken "junk baxes" of local antique dealers, with other centennial tokens, thus making the issue almost certainly one of an "official" issue status instead of a "mule" created by the manufacturer to supply collectors with "rare" issues.

The city of Lansing did not issue any general circulation tokens for its 125th birthday celebration in 1984, but did issue a token good for 25¢ in city parking meters. The token reads as follows: LANSING/ (outline of city skyline)/125 YEARS/ 1859-1984. The reverse of the token reads: A BIRTHDAY CEL-EBRATION/ PARKING/ VALUE/ 25¢/ 125 YEARS. IL is listed in the section for Lansing parking tokens in this booklet.

LANSING CIVIL WAR TOKENS

LANSING CIVIL WAR TOKENS (1863)

The Civil War, starting with the firing of the guns at Fort Sumter in 1861, was to be the reason for the issuance of a new form of necessity money. The civil war token, issued main. ly between 1862 and 1864, was to fill a need for small change by the merchants of the north. Tokens were issued in approximately 400 towns, with approximately 11,000 different varieties of these tokens known to collectors today.

The need for civil war tokens arose from the use of deficit financing during the war by both the union and the confederacy. The increasing amount of flat currency (currency not backed by gold or silver) coupled with the great degree of uncertainty regarding the outcome of the war made the holding of hard assets the only real way to store value. Coinage of gold and silver, and even the lowly copper-nickel cent, was hoarded as the value of the newly printed greenbacks began to tumble. The greenback (United States Note) hit a low of 39g in gold value in the summer of 1863, and with this came a virtual absence

The merchants of the north, faced with great problems in making change, were to resort to several solutions to this problem. One of the solutions was to issue fractional currency (currency with face amounts under \$1.00) in order to make change for the government greenbacks then in circulation. Postage stamps were also circulated as change, but their frailty contributed to their early demise as a circulating medium. The encasament of postage stamps in brass and mica frames was also tried, but the process turned out to be too expensive for practical applications. The solution to the drastic shortage of small change was to be filled by the use of the shinplater (frac-

tional currency) and the use of the civil war token. The civil war token, generally issued and accepted at its unstated value of 1¢, came into general circulation in late 1862. These tokens, issued for the most part from 1862 to 1864. were to help alleviate the shortage of small change and to provice a profit for those who issued them. These pieces contained about 1/4¢ of copper, and on a wholesale basis they are said to have been issued at a cost of about 70g per hundred. This gave the issuing merchant a profit of about 3/10 of a cent for each piece

The refusal by some of the merchants who issued the tokens to redeem them at their unstated face value of 1g was one of the bigger reasons for the discontinuation of the series and its

being outlawed in 1864. By then, the amount of fractional currency in circulation and the new issuance of bronze 1¢ pieces was to eliminate the need for the civil war token.

The city of Lansing (1860 population - 3,047) had two merchants that chose to issue civil war tokens through their establishments. Listings for the two Lansing civil war token issuers appear on the next few pages. All known Lansing civil war tokens were manufactured by W.K. Lanphear & Company of

Andrew J. Viele appears in the 1860 State Cazetteer as a dealer in books, stationery, wallpaper, and fancy goods. In the 1863 State Gazetteer he is listed as dealing in books, stationery, paper hanging, piano fortes, melodeons, and as agent for the American Express Concary. He appears in the 1867 gazetteer as a dealer in all of the above, as well as being in the gold & silver, watches, jewelry, and plated ware business. Andrew J. Viele did business at the southeast corner of Washington and Michigan Avenues, the site presently occupied by first of America (formerly American Bank and Trust). Andrew J. Viele's City Book Store disappears by the 1873 Michigan State Gazetteer.

David Ekstein appears in the 1856 State Gazetteer as the proprietor of a "variety store" which stocked eigars, toys, and other items. He is listed as a hide and leather dealer in 1860, with his address listed as Crand Street. In the 1863 Cazetteer he is listed on Washington Avenue in Middle Town (now downtown Lansing) as a tanner and dealer in groceries and provisions. He continued as a Lanner through the 1865 gazetteer, and is listed as being a grocer on Washington Avenue in the 1867 through 1880's

LANSING ENCASED CENTS (1907-1972)

The encasement of United States one cent pieces in alumtout frames first became popular around the turn of the century, with the pieces becoming a popular souvenir item. Merchants that saw the advertising potential of the pieces began to issue them as store cards, and most people that received these pieces kept them rather than throwing them away, as the face value of the encased cent made the discarding of these pieces tantamount to throwing out money! Because the pieces had a face value (in U.S. money) and were difficult to remove from the aluminum frames without the use of substantial amounts of force, they tended to be set aside in jewelry boxes and dresser drawers and saved.

Seven different issuers of Lansing encased cents are known of today, with a wide range of dates observed on the pieces. The earliest known Lansing encasement is that of Dad's Smoke Shop (1907) followed by that of the Hauger-Martin Co. (1912-14). After this comes the issue of the Botary Club (1939), then Shepard's shoes (1946-52), followed by L.D. Mahan (1956), the Greater Lansing Chamber of Commerce (1955-70), and Finally by the J.W. Knapp Co. (1972). Given enough time it appears likely that other new issues may crop up, as the pieces are still being manufactured and new advertisers are likely to see the long term advertising potential of the pieces.

The decision to list Lansing encased cents in the catalog is mainly due to the fact that the pieces all have a stated face value of 1¢, thus making the pieces monetarily related. As a general rule these pleces did not circulate as money, and they are really more a souvenir item than currency. Listings are similar to the listings for Lansing merchant tokens.

DAD'S SMOKE SHOP (1908-1912) E100 Arthur D. Huntington's cigar shop and restaurant first appears in the 1908 city directory, with the address listed at 117 West Michigan Avenue. The listings for Huntington's business continue through the 1912 city directory at this address. In the 1913 directory A.D. Huntington is listed as operating a restaurant, cigar store, and pool hall, although he is no longer listed at 117 West Michigan Avenue.

Knapp Co., founded near the turn of the century, maintained its original store at 300-06 South Washington Avenue from 1936-1972, when it chose to branch out due to the decline of business in the central city. The trend toward decentralized shopping mails eventually attracted the Knapp Co., which opened its Lansing Mall addition in 1972. The Lansing Mall Knapp's store gave out these encased cents during the opening few weeks of their operations In 1972. The parent firm of the J.W. Knapp Co. went bankrupt in 1980, and with this came the closing of the Knapp's chain.


Homer D. Shepard's first shoe store appears at 328 South Washington Avenue in the 1939 city directory. By 1946 he had incorporated and had stores in Lansing, East Lansing, and Charlotte. In his advertisement in the 1946 directory it is noted that all fittings are checked by X-ray (hmmm..). Shepard's Shoes last appears in the 1989 telephone



LANSING PARKING TOKENS (1962-Date)

Lansing parking tokens are a relatively new item on the Lansing numismatic market, having made their first appearance in 1962 when the F.N. Arbaugh department store issued its first tokens. Various tokens continue in use to this day, with the City of Lansing and Lansing Community College continuing to use tokens. It appears quite likely that there will be more parking

Parking tokens can serve a variety of functions. The tokens of the Ingham Medical Center, for example, were used to control who parks in the center's lot. The city of Lansing tokens are given out by merchants in order to give their customers a rebate on the parking cost in downtown Lansing. They are also usable for payment of parking tickets, for meter use, and they serve as a revenue source for the city when sold to collectors.

Token listings are similar to the listings for Lansing merchant tokens, and are done alphabetically.

P100 F.N. ARBAUGH (1962-69)

The F.N. Arbaugh Company, founded by Frank N. Arbaugh In 1906, was the issuer of this token starting in 1962. The F.N. Arbaugh department store operated through 1969, when it fell victim to the rising trend toward decentralized shopping malls and away from the central city as the main business district. The store was located at 401-23 South

The City of Lansing parking tokens were usable at two per fare for CATA buses (probably at three per fare now). Lansing issued four varieties to start, including such mottos on the tokens as: " Capital City - Partners in Progress", "Lansing - an Exciting Place to Shop", "Shop Downtown Lansing", and "Shop in Lansing -Park Free". Its latest issue is its token commemorating Lansing's 125th birthday, issued in 1984.

The St. Lawrence Hospital, built in 1924 at 1210 West Saginaw, was the issuer of this token, starting in the 1970's. The token was used to control parking in the hospital lot, and was issued by PARCOA. The Hospital name is misspelled on the token as the "ST. LAWERENCE" hospital. The hospital also issued zinc "radio token" pieces which are listed in the merchant token section of the listings.


LANSING TRANSPORTATION TOKENS 1886-DATE

Lansing transportation tokens reflect in many ways the crowth of the city of Lansing and the technology of the times, from the horse and buggy era through the electric and gasoline years. The first tokens were those made for the Lansing City Railway Company, which used the horsecar for its first four years of operation, switching over to the use of the electric streetcar in 1890. The electric streetcar continued in use in Lansing through 1932, with the following four companies issuing tokens which were good for one streetcar fare: 1. Lansing City Railway Company (1886-94); 2. Michigan Railway Company (1917-21); 3. Michigan United Railways Company (1922-23); 4. Michigan Electric Railway Company (1924-27). Peoples Transport Corporation took over with gasoline powered buses in 1933, with all of the companies that followed also using the gas powered bus. Tokens were issued in most cases to give regular riders a preak in the price of the fare, or to designate a special type of fare. Examples of this are the CATA tokens which were originally issued at 2 For 90g, giving the customer a 5g per fare discount off the regular fare of 50g per ride. Tokens good for special types of fares are exemplified by the Lansing City Lines. tokens, which were good for one school fare, and by the City of Lansing tokens which were good for reduced fares for senior



Token listings are similar to the listings for merchant tokens, but have been slightly changed to include cutout shapes in the center of the takens. Just before the rarity rating is given the cutout in the center of the token, or if the token is solid it is listed in that column as Sd. The listings are as follows:

1st column: Token letter (designates the variety of token for the individual company) 2nd column: Diameter (in millimeters) 3rd column: Material/Colors 4th column: Shape 5th column: Cut Out Shape (as illustrated below) 6th column: Rarity



Token listings in the transportation section are done chronologically rather than elphabetically. Atwood catalog numbers and mintages (when known) follow the description of the reverse of the tokens.



T100 LANSING CITY RAILWAY COMPANY (1886-94)

The Lansing City Railway Company received its city franchise in January 1886, and operated a horsecar line in Lansing from 1886 to 1890. It chose to electrify its lines in 1890, with the first trial of its new electric line on August 26, 1890. The name Lansing City Railway Company continued through the 1894 city directory, changing in the 1896 directory to the Lansing Electric Railway Company. The tokens issued by the Lansing City Railway Company are among the rarest and most desirable tokens issued in the city of Lansing.

Michigan Railways Company originated in 1911 as a holding company that controlled 100% of the stock of Michigan United Railways Company, a company that ran electric railways in several communities in southern Michigan. In the 1917 to 1921 Lansing city directories the name of the streetcar line is listed as Michigan Railways Company, with the name changing back to Michigan United Railways Company in the 1922 city directory. The Michigan Railway Company had its offices at 412 E. Shiawassee and its waiting room at 116 E. Michigan from 1917-18, with the waiting room moving to 314 E. Michigan in the 1919-21 directorles.





PART III

PAPER MONEY

The scrip and obsolete notes listed below represent the earliest form of money known to be from the city (even before incorporation) of Lansing, dating back to 1851 when the notes of fills E. Beebe first appeared. The next issue, the notes from the Bank of the Capitol appear not to have been issued for meneral circulation, but instead as proof notes only, and are represented by only two known notes, a \$3.00 note and a \$5.00 note, both unissued proofs.

Harold L. Bowen in his book Early Michigan Scrip lists two additional notes, those of the Homer & Genoa Turnoike Company, and G.W. Gray & Company with purported histories. Both notes are believed not to be of Lansing, Michigan origin, with this making Bowen's history of other Lansing issues subject to doubt. Bowen's history of the Homer and Genoa Turnpike Company notes states: "Incorporated April 6, 1817. Capital \$20,000. President and Cashier H.T. Brinkerhoff, Closed 1821." It would he interesting to find out where Bowen gets this information, as Lansing did not exist until 1847 and did not receive the name Lansing until 1848 (it was Michigan, Michigan before this). The notes of G.W. Gray & Company, also of "Lansing" origin (although they do not say Michigan on them) are also delisted in this listing, as the author can find no evidence that the notes are indeed of Lansing, Michican origin. Bowen states the history of the firm as follows: "Established 1860. George W. gray and H.H. Hemenway owned a general store. Closed 1863." In researching this note I could find absolutely no listings for G.W. Gray, H.H. Hemenway, John Barry (the signer on the note observed), or Haislet Bro's Printing (the printer listed on the note). Listings were checked in the 1860 and 1863 Michigan State Gazetteer, with none found. Considering Bowen's track record on the Homer and Genoa Turnpike Company notes, I feel safe in deleting this note from my listings. It is my belief that the note probably is from Lansingburgh, New York, although I do not have the research access to the appropriate New York city directorles and state

gazetteers to find out.



E.E. BEEBE (1849-64)

According to Bowen Ellis E. Beebe established his clothing, hats and caps store in Lansing in 1849. Listings were found to substantiate this company's existance in the 1856 and 1863-4 State Gazetteers. Beebe disappears after the 1863-4 listing. Since Bowen seems to have been able to establish a reasonable closing date for the firm I'll take it on faith that he was correct and use his starting date for the company. This note

is at present the only known scrip note issued in the city of Lansing to have seen circulation in town before the Civil War. At present only one note is known, with that note illustrated on the previous page.

BANK OF THE CAPITOL (1859-1864?)

According to Harold Bowen the Bank of the Capitol was: "Established 1859, President: Whitney Jones, Cashier T. Cummins, Closed 1864." Local History buff and fellow collector Graig Whitford found the following substantiation for the bank's existance in the Lansing State Republican:

Tuesday, July 26, 1859: "Bank of the Capitol: The brick building of F.M. Cowles has been selected for the Banking-House by this institution. and the work of fitting-up and furnishing has already commenced. A large and substantial vault is to be put in, and it is expected that the banking apartments will be in readiness for occupation by the 15th of August."

Tuesday, August 23, 1859: "Bank Vault: The vault of the Bank of the Capitol, arrived from Detroit on Monday. It is of boiler iron, five feet wide, eight in height, and nine feet in length."

Apparently the notes listed below never saw circulation in Lansing, as they have been observed as "proof" notes only, with three punch cancels each through the Cashier's and the President's signature block area. One each are known of the \$3.00 and \$5.00 notes, with both specimens exhibiting identical punch cancels. Since the typical sheet layout of the period for a sheet containing a \$3.00 and \$5.00 bill would have been a 1-2-3-5 sheet one wonders if maybe there is a \$1.00 note and a \$2.00 note out there remaining to be discovered. Time will tell on this one.

The notes from the Bank of the Capitol are among the most beautiful numismatic Items produced in the city of Lansing. They are a first rate product Issued by the American Bank Note Company of New York using two separate plates to print the black and orange portions of the notes. The combination of the beauty of the notes with the rarity of each (only one known of each at present) accounts for the high price tag of \$1000 which I have



The National Banking Act of February 25, 1863 was responsible for the creation of a new form of currency in the United States. The National Bank Note, born in December 1863 as a result of United States indebtedness caused by the Civil war, was issued in order to provide a source for sales for U.S. Government bonds. The National Banks were allowed to issue currency in amounts up to 90% of the face value of the bonds, with the currency being secured by the bonds (except from 1908-16 when the notes were allowed to be backed by "other securities"). The need for a market for United States bonds was alleviated ty the 1930's, and with this came the demise of the National Bank Note. National Bank Notes were last issued on July 10, 1935 to The First National Bank of Chillicothe. Ohio, bringing an end to the National Currency era.

Out of the 14000+ National Banks chartered in the United States only six were from Lansing, with five of them choosing to issue currency. The first bank to be chartered was the First National Bank of Lansing, which was chartered in February, 1864, and which lasted through December 1864 when it was absorbed by the Second National. The Second National Bank of Lansing, also chartered in 1864, was the first of Lansing's National Banks to issue currency, with its operations lasting through 1884. The next note issuing National Bank was the Lansing National Bank, which operated from 1872 to 1892, when It gave up Its federal charter to do business under the more liberal state banking laws. The next bank to follow was the City National Bank, which received its charter in 1886 and continued in business through 1931. After that came the Capital National bank which received its charter in 1906 and continued in business through 1934. Last, but not least, is the Lansing National Bank, which opened in 1934 and continues in business to this day under the name Michigan National Bank.

Many of Lansing's more prominent citizens have appeared as signers of Lansing National Currency, with the list including such famous local individuals as R.E. Olds, Edward W. Sparrow, Benjamin Franklin Davis, Richard H. Scott, and Ray Potter.

Out of the 1,133,519 notes produced for Lansing's National Banks a total of 38 distinct types were produced, with only 18 of these types known to collectors today. Only about 50-60 of the "large" (pre-1929) notes and about 200-250 of the "small" (series 1929) notes are known today.

KEY TO LISTINGS.

SHEET LAYOUT: Lansing National Currency was issued in sheets of four notes on the low denomination (under \$50.00) large size (pre-1929) notes. On the \$50.00 and \$100.00 denomination notes the sheets consisted of two notes, one fifty and one hundred. On the small size (series 1929) notes the sheets were printed six to a sheet, all notes having the same denomination. 1-1-1-2 would indicate that the top three notes on the sheet were one dollar notes, with the bottom note being a two dollar note. 50-100 would indicate that the top note of the sheet was a fifty, and the bottom note a hundred.

SHEET NUMBERS: On the large size (pre-1929) notes the same serial number was applied to all notes on the sheet. On the 1929 type 1 notes the same serial number is applied to all six notes on the sheet, with a different prefix letter on each note to indicate sheet position. On the 1929 type 2 notes a different serial number is applied to each note on the sheet. Sheets of the large size and 1929 type 1 notes changed serials after each sheet.

OF NOTES: The number of actual notes printed for a given series and denomination are given in this column. For example, If 1000 sheets of a 1-1-1-2 sheet were printed with serials 1-1000 there would be 3000 \$1.00 notes printed and 1000 \$2.00 notes.

VERY GOOD: A note in Very Good condition is quite well worn, but still intact. the note may exhibit significant wear, a few minor paper separations around the borders, and some staining, but is still in presentable condition.

VERY FINE: A note in Very Fine condition is very lightly circulated, and still retains about 2/3 of its original crispness, yet may show some minor soiling or staining and some heavy creases and folds.

CRISP NEW: A Crisp New note has never been folded, and is a note which has been withheld from ordinary channels of circulation.

RARITY FACTOR: The Rarity Factor is patterned after the listings in Standard Catalog of National Bank Notes by John Hickman and Dean Oakes, with the addition of an R7 rating which indicates that no notes are known from a given issue. The listings are as follows:

Known - R1 - Very Common 50+ 25-50 Known - R2 - Common 12-25 Known - R3 - Scarce 6-11 Known - R4 - Very Scarce Known - R5 - Rare 3-5 Known - R6 - Very Rare 1-2 0 Known - R7 - Unknown

PRICES: Prices listed are the authors estimate of the retail value of the notes in the condition listed, and are based on observations of sales between collectors and dealers.

#264 THE SECOND NATIONAL BANK OF LANSING

The story of The Second National Bank of Lansing really begins in 1850 when Joseph C. Bailey opened his exchange office at the northwest corner of Washington and Michigan. In 1855 he moved the exchange office to his newly erected 2 story building at the northwest corner of that same intersection. He continued his exchange business through 1862 when Charles S. Hunt joined up with him and formed a bank (J.C. Bailey & Co.). On February 4, 1864 their bank became The First National Bank of Lansing (federal charter #232), a bank which existed on paper only and never opened its doors to the public or issued any currency. The First National Bank of Lansing was sold out to The Second National on December 5, 1864, and J.C. Bailey returned to private banking.

The Second National Bank of Lansing received its federal charter (#264) on February 18, 1864, and had a capital of \$50,000 at that time. Its first officers included James 1. Mead, President; Hiram H. Smith, Vice President (H.H. Smith was also the first Mayor of Lansing, serving in 1859) and Joseph Mills, Cashier. Ephralm Longyear became the Cashier of the bank in 1873, and eventually was to control the bank, taking over its Presidency in 1876 and continuing in that capacity through July 31, 1884, when the bank gave up its national charter to become Longyear's Bank (a private bank).

Longyear's bank continued in operation through 1886, when it was succeeded by The City National Bank of Lansing (charter #3513). The City National Bank of Lansing also issued currency, which is listed later on in this section.

Notes from The Second National Bank of Lansing are quite rare today, with only three surviving notes known, all of the notes being one dollar bills. One is an "original series" note; the other two are series 1875 \$1.00 notes.

#1953 THE LANSING NATIONAL BANK

The Lansing National Bank traces its origins back to 1866 when John J. Bush and Lewis D. Carr opened their banking house at the corner of Washington and Michigan. In 1869 John J. Bush joined up with Nelson G. Isbell to form the partnership of Isbell and Bush, which was located in the Lansing House. This partnership lasted through April 4, 1872 when The Lansing National

The Lansing National Bank opened its doors at the southeast corner of Washington and Michigan on April 1, 1872, and received its federal charter on April 4, 1872. Its first officers included John J. Bush, President; Orlando Mack Barnes, Vice President; and Merritt L. Coleman, Cashier. The opening capital of the bank was \$60,000.00, which grew considerably, reaching \$185,000.00

by the time the bank converted to a state bank in 1892. The story of The Lansing National Bank does not end on March 5, 1892 when the bank gave up its federal charter in order to do business under more liberal state banking laws. The bank operated under the name Lansing State Savings Bank from 1892 to 1921, with the title changing in 1921 to American State Savings Bank upon its merger with American State Savings Bank. A trust department was later added, and when that occurred the name of the bank became American Bank and Trust. American Bank and Trust merged with several other banks in the early 1980's to become

First of America, and it is now doing business under this name. Notes from The Lansing National Bank are extremely rare today, with reliable sources indicating that only one note is known from the bank. A check drawn on The Lansing National Bank is used for the illustration above.

#3513 THE CITY NATIONAL BANK OF LANSING

The City National Bank of Lansing traces its origins back to 1850 when Joseph C. Balley opened his exchange office at the northwest corner of Washington and Michigan. Bailey later Joined up with Charles S. Hunt to form a bank (J.C. Bailey and Company) which operated from 1862 to 1864, which became The First National Bank of Lansing (charter #232) on February 4, 1864. The bank existed on paper only, never opening its doors to the public, and it was absorbed by The Second National Bank of Lansing (charter #264) on December 5, 1864. The Second National Bank of Lansing operated from 1865 to 1884, after which it gave up its federal charter to become Longyears Bank (a

The City National Bank of Lansing received its federal charter (#3513) on June 1, 1886 and succeeded Longyears Bank, taking over its location at the northeast corner of Washington and Michigan. Its first officers included Edward S. Sparrow, President: E.F. Cooley, Vice President; and Benjamin Franklin Davis, Cashier. It opened with a capital of \$100,000.00, which was to grow to \$500,000.00 by the time the bank closed in 1931.

Benjamin Franklin Davis was the main driving force behind the bank, remaining with the City National from its start in 1886 to its close in 1931. He held the position of cashier from 1886 to 1909, and in 1909 he took over the presidency of the bank upon the death of Edward W. Sparrow. He remained president of the bank through January 1930, when he became chairman of the board, a position which he held through the close of the bank in December, 1931.

The City National Bank of Lansing fell victim to the depression, and was liquidated on December 26, 1931. Assets of the bank were sold to The Capital National Bank of Lansing. The bank was never able to occupy its new headquarters, the City National Tower, a 15 story structure located at the northwest corner of Washington and Michigan. The City National tower was completed in 1932, less than a year after the close of the bank, and it became the headquarters of The Bank of Lansing.

Notes from The City National Bank of Lansing are frequently available in small size, and are only occasionally available in

large size. Only one series 1882 note is known on the bank, with the balance of the large size notes being series 1902 notes. Of the known 1902 notes, only one is recorded at present with the "date back" (1902-1908 on the reverse, issued ca. 1909-16) with the balance being the "plain" back without the dates. It is estimated that only about 20 of the large size notes and about 75 of the small size notes are known on this bank. The City National Bank also issued a token good for 50¢ on a new account which is listed in the token section of this booklet.

#8148 THE CAPITAL NATIONAL BANK OF LANSING

The Capital National Bank of Lansing was organized on January 16, 1906 with a capital of \$100,000.00. Its first officers included Ranson E. Olds, President; James J. Saird, vice President; and John E. Whitham, Cashier. Its original location, which it kept through 1931, was the Hollister Block, located at the northwest corner of Washington and Allegan. The bank later moved to the Olds Tower (now the Michigan National Tower) upon its completion in 1931.

Lansing automotive pioneer R.E. Dids was the driving force behind the Capital National Bank. Olds remained president of the bank from its organization in 1906 until 1931 when he resigned its presidency to become chairman of the board. Olds remained in that capacity through the close of the bank in 1934.

The beginning of the end of the Capital National Bank began in late 1931 when the City National Bank of Lansing got into trouble. The Capital National Bank guaranteed the deposits of the City National Bank, although a price had to be paid. REO Motor Works had to deposit one million dollars into the Capital National Bank for a year in order to make the arrangement work. The City National Bank of Lansing was liquidated on December 26, 1931, and its assets were consolidated with those of the Capital National Bank.

The Capital National Bank finally fell victim to the dperession, being placed in conservatorship on March 23, 1933, then into receivership on March 13, 1934. The Lansing National Bank (charter #14032) guickly moved in and purchased certain assets of the Capital National, as well as taking over its location in the Olds Tower.

A rather gruesome incident occurred on January 26, 1932 at the Capital National Bank. A customer, Deak J. Mead, feeling that the bank had done him a grave injustice, decided to "shoot up the bank". Wounded in the assault were Albert A. Elsesser (the cashier), John K. Lilley (a customer), David Timmons (a bank officer), and Miss Frances L. Duncan (a customer). B.W. Nichols, cashier of the Olds Motor Works, was killed in the assault.

Notes from the Capital National Bank are the most obtainable of Lansing's five national banks. Approximately 35 large

size notes are known on the bank as well as about 100 small size notes. The Capital National Bank also issued tokens good for 50g on a new savings account which are listed in the token section of this booklet.

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#14032 LANSING NATIONAL BANK

Lansing National Bank (federal charter #14032) received its. charter in February, 1934, with an opening capital of \$600,000.00 (the same amount as the capital of the Capital National Bank when it was placed in receivership in 1934). Its first officers included Richard H. Scott, Chairman of the Board; Ray Potter, President; and Miles D. Grant, Cashier.

When the Capital National Bank was placed in receivership on March 13, 1934 the Lansing National Bank moved into the Olds Tower and purchased certain assets of the bank. The vast majority of the Capital National Bank's old business was taken over by Lansing National, which retained many of the personell

In 1941 Lansing National Bank consolidated with 5 other national banks in outstate cities to form the Michigan National Bank. It continues in business to this day.

Notes from Lansing National Bank are scarce today, but are occasionally available. It is estimated that approximately 20 notes are known on this bank today, roughly equally split between \$10 and \$20 bills. All known notes bear the Miles D. Grant/ Ray Potter signature combination.

Lansing, like the rest of the nation, was hit hard by the great depression of the 1930's. The state banking holiday declared by Governor Comstock on February 14, and in theory lasting until February 21, was to have lasting repercussions and send a shock wave across the country, eventually resulting in the declaration of a national bank holiday on March 6, 1933. The bank holiday of March 6, 1933 created many hardships for local governments, businesses, and individuals nationwide, as well as in Lansing, due to the long term bank closures and restrictions on currency and gold hearding. Numerous local governmental units and businesses issued currency and tokens to help alleviate the problems caused by the currency shortages. Lansing had three different issuers of "depression scrip" to

help to fill the void.

The first issuer of depression scrip in Lansing was Community co-operative Industries, Inc., with the first issue of notes appearing in on April 3, 1933. This organization, patterned after the Minneapolis organization The Organized Unemployed, Inc., issued notes in denominations of 5g, 10g, 50g, \$1.00, \$5.00, and \$10.00. According to one elderly gentleman that I talked to, the notes could be earned by working for the Co-op on a piecework basis, and were redeemable for goods and services at the Co-op. The notes were later used to a limited degree at other businesses throughout the city. They are today the most common of the Lansing depression scrip issues.

The next issuer in Lansing was the Lansing Dealer's Association, Inc., which issued notes with face amounts of 25d, 50d, \$1.00, \$5.00 and \$10.00 starting on April 7, 1933. The notes bear the facsimile signatures of H.J. Henry, President, and S.R. Dietrich, Treasurer, with the central vignette of the note featuring the state capitol. The issue was apparently short lived, or perhaps the most widely redeemed, as it ranks as the scarcest of the Lansing depression scrip issues. The notes were backed by 150 businesses in the city.

Last, and certainly not least, were the issues of the city Listings for Lansing depression scrip are presented in a

of Lansing, first issued April 15, 1933, and bearing face amounts of \$1.00, \$5.00, and \$10.00. These notes were issued to city employees in amounts up to 25% of their pay, and were redeemable by the city when used to pay city taxes or for payment of electric & water bills at the Board of Water & Light, the city owned utility commision. Three notes are known of this issue in uncancelled condition at present, all being \$1.00 bills that were apparently presented for redemption in 1937 but refused. slightly different format than Lansing national currency, as the notes come in various "states of existance" including specimen notes, issued & cancelled notes, and issued and uncancelled notes. A separate listing will appear for each known "state of existance" will be given, including price and rarity information for each variety.

Lansing depression scrip is by no means common, and it is the author's estimate that only about 50-60 of these notes are known in collector hands today.

CITY OF LANSING (1933)

The City of Lansing depression scrip notes were essentially an emergency issue designed to help smooth out cash flow problems in the city caused by the depression. They were first issued on April 15, 1935 to city employees, who received 75% cash and 25% or their pay in these scrip notes. The notes were redeemable in settlement of accounts with the city owned Boark of Water & Light and were also redeemable for payment of city taxes. \$5000.00 worth of these notes formed the first issue of scrip, with the notes

redeemable at face value by the city on January 1st, 1934. Apparently the notes were redeemed and faded out of existence relatively quickly, as the only known uncancelled notes, three one dollar bills, were found with a deposit slip from a bank in Mason with the slip marked "payment refused" in 1937. All other notes known are specimen notes. It would appear that the city issued a fairly large number of notes, as the highest serial numbers observed on the notes are as follows: \$1.00 - 17,504, \$5.00 - 2,503, \$10.00 - 1,004. Judging from these numbers, it appears that an issue of over \$40,000 was created out of the City Council authori-

City of Lansing notes are all quite rare today, with an estimated 15 notes known to collectors of all three denominations combined. Uncancelled notes are only known on the \$1.00 bill, with three pieces reported extant. Specimen notes are known on the one dollar notes, with the SPECIMEN overprint across the face

of the note and with punch cancellations in the signatures. All known notes bear the printed signatures of Peter F. Gray as Mayor and Berth Ray as city clerk. Issued notes also bear the pen signature of Robert E. Sanderson as City Comptroller.

the first organization to issue scrip in the city of Lansing was Community Co-Operative Industries, Inc., with the issues of was Community Co-Operative Industril 3, 1933 Lansing State Journal this company reported in the April 3, 1933 Lansing State Journal article entitled "Pay first scrip in self help plan". In the article it states that the first scrip in the self-help plan was issued last week to R.E. Kay, and the article further states that "over 1000 persons have called at the headquarters and registered for work". Kay received \$1.25 worth of the scrip and thus became the first person in Lansing to receive depression

The scrip was apparently fairly widely accepted, as an article in the April 20, 1933 Lansing State Journal Indicates that it was accepted by most businesses in town. The notes were reducemble at the headquarters of the business in exchange for goods and services offered by Community Co-Operative industries, and were obtainable by working for the company on a piecework basis,

The Co-Op was patterned after a Minneapolis, Minnesota operation called "The Organized Unemployed, Inc." which started issuing scrip in 1932 in the form of "Barter and Trade Certificate" notes. Apparently, the scrip idea also came from this organization. as the notes from Community Co-Operative Industries state themselves to be "Trade and Barter Certificate" notes.

The fractional denomination notes (5g, 10g, 50g) come with the printed signature of Fred A. Kreatz. Kreatz was also a signer on dollar demominated (\$1, \$5, \$10) notes, as was G.E. Boyd, whose signature appears on later issues of the dollar demosinated

Notes from Community Co-Operative Industries, Inc. are by far the most common of the Lansing depression scrip issues, with about 35-40 notes known to collectors today on all issues combined. The fractional notes are fairly common, especially the 5¢ & 10¢ issues, and the dollar denominated notes are quite scarce, with only cancelled notes known to collectors today.

LANSING DEALER'S ASSOCIATION, INC. (1933)

Scrip of the Lansing Dealer's Association made its first appearance in Lansing on Friday, April 7, 1933, according to an article of the same date in the Lansing State Journal. The article further elaborates on the purpose and scope of the issue stating "The scrip plan was adopted to meet an emergency caused by currency stringency...Officers of the New association consist of Herbert Henry, president; Carl C. Jaeger, vice president; C. Frank Stabler, secretary; S.R. Dietrich, treasurer... The Lansing Dealers Association, incorporated, consists of 150 members to date with twice that many applications on file. The association is decisively representative of Lansing's business world. Every line in Lansing from undertaker to grocer; oil and gas companies with local station, fuel dealers, clothiers, dry goods, shoe merchants, even restaurants, is disclosed in the roster of the charter men-

The use of the scrip notes created by the Lansing Dealer's Association was apparently quite short lived, as is evidenced by the rarity of the notes themselves. At present, only two uncancelled notes are known from this issuer, with both notes being 25g notes. All other known notes are known only as issued but cancelled notes. All known notes bear the printed signatures of H.J. Henry as President and S.R. Dietrich as Treasurer. There are an estimated 10 notes known to collectors today of sil varieties combined.

The first edition of Lansing's Money included tokens & paper money issued in the city limits of Lansing only, with ng attempt made to list tokens from East Lansing or the Lake Lansing area. This was partly due to the lack of early city directories of the two areas listed, and partly due to the author's wish to keep the original edition at a manageable size, as the question arises just where the Lansing area "ends", as one could think of Eaton Rapids, Grand Ledge, Holt, Mason, and a variety of other small local communities as being a part of "Lansing". The decision to list East Lansing and the Lake Lansing area are partly due to the shared "Lansing" name and partly due to the extremely close ties that these communities have had over the years.

East Lansing had its real beginning in 1855 when a land grant was made to the Michigan Agricultural College, with the college opening in 1857. A number of permanent structures were built in that year, the first non-farm structures in the area. With the growth of the college came a substantial prowth both on and off campus, with the place name remaining "Agricultural College, Michigan" until the city was incorporated on May 8, 1907. The population of East Lansing upon incorporation was a mere 650 or so souls, making East Lansing the smallest incorporated city in the state at that time! The population of East Lansing now exceeds 40,000 souls, with the University still by far the largest employer in the city!

The tokens of East Lansing now number thirty varieties In the present listing, with more varieties sure to follow. One Lansing token, an issue of C.J. Cook, appears to be a nonmaverick East Lansing metal merchant token, but unfortunately upon further research the piece turned out to be a Lansing issue: It can be found on page 71 (#1825)



The tokens of Haslett Park and Lake Lansing are very rare today, with only three known listings, and four known tokens! The only known token from Haslett Park, Michigan is shown above.

CORAL GABLES SHOW BAR (1920's-date)

The Coral Gables show bar, erected in the 1920's in Meridian Township east of East Lansing has been one of the more popular student and faculty "matering holes" in the East Lansing area since the 1930's when the withdrawal of prohibition left a wide open market for taverns and beer gardens. East Lansing remained "dry" until about 1967, leaving those with an unquenchable thirst to go outside the city limits to procure their refreshments. On the east side of East Lansing the Coral Gables show bar did an admirable job in fulfilling those needs. The show bar itself closed in the early 1980's, although the restaurant and bar in the front of the building still operate. Judging from the style of the tokens I would say that they probably originated in the 1970's, although I don't personally recall thir use there when I was a frequent patron. The Coral Gables is still located at 2838 East Grand River Avenue just east of East Lansing in Meridian Township.

EAST LANSING STATE BANK (1916=1986) 200

East Lansing State Bank was chartered on May 31, 1916, with an original capital stock of \$20,000. Its assets rapidly grew, with assets totaling about \$200,000 by the end of 1916. Addison Brown was the first President of the bank, serving from 1916 to about 1926. The bank originally was at the corner of Grand River and Evergreen Avenues, and moved on November 3, 1927 to its long term headquarters at 100 West Grand River Avenue, a location it held through the balance of its existance. The bank eventually fell to the trend toward bigger banks, with the bank becoming a subsidiary of Spartan Bancorp, a local holding company, in 1983. In January 1986 the preliminary agreement was signed to join Bank One. The bank issued two different pieces of exonumia that are presently known, the below listed token, and an encased cent which will be listed in the "special uses" token category a few pages from now. The token below was found in a 39"x49" cloth on metal coin bank inscribed in raised letters "EAST/ LANSING/ STATE BANK/ ____/ EAST LANSING,/ MICH." on the front and "LESSONS/ IN/ THRIFT/ ROBERT/ MORRIS/ VOL. V" on the spine of the "book". Only two of these are presently known and they are of fairly high value as a metal "good for" from East Lansing, a very scarce town to find.

With the death of disco the bar attempted to adapt to the changing student lifestyles, going with the punk rock craze for a little while and finally dying a merciful death by 1982.

As the boom in video games went on the decline, so did the number of establishments catering to the video game crowd. Pin Pan Alley was not to survive the decline, and only a few diehard gameroom proprietors in the area were able to survive until the present, the most notable of these being Tim and Tom Arnold with their Pinball Pete's video, pinball, and pool arcade. I'm told that Pinball Pete's also issued a good-for wooden nickel, but I have yet to see one to verify this.

The only parking tokens known to collectors of East Lansing tokens are those issued by various facilities on the Michigan state University campus. These tokens were used to control access to parking in the lots used to access the facilities, and as a general rule these tokens were used mainly by non-students having business in these facilities. Tokens are presently known from the Clinical Center, Olin Memorial Hospital, MSU Psychiatry clinics, MSU Veterinary Medicine, and "generic" "MSU PARKING" tokens.

The tokens were apparently issued starting in the 1970's at to a new token size, as the newest tokens observed have a 25mm dismeter; these are 3mm larger than the old 22mm tokens. Histories of the individual issuing entities will not be given here, as it is felt that that information would be somewhat superfluous to the reader. Die varieties of the tokens, when observed, have been included in the listings. It is the opinion of the author that not all of the existing die varieties have

The reason for this variance in rarity is at present not known; perhaps someday the explanation will be made known or a hoard will appear.

Even at the time of issue they were difficult to obtain, as the merchants would not hand them out to collectors; a purchase had to be made and the token had to be asked for to get one! According to the Atwood Catalogue the tokens were struck January 29, 1979.


William Megiveron (note the difference in spelling with that appearing on the token) was the proprietor of the Nakoma house in Haslett Park from 1889 until 1896, with the hotel burning down in 1896. The attribution to this hotel is based on the place name appearing on the token; Haslett Park did not come into existance until September 19, 1890 when its name changed from Pine Lake to Haslett Park; on June 28, 1895 the post office became the Haslett post office, the word Park being dropped from the title.

The misspelling of the proprietors name on the token is probably explained by the writing of the token order in longhand when it was taken. The iv in Megiveron was almost certainly read as a w.

These tokens were issued while Haslett Park was a great spititualist center. The town quite often would draw crowds numbering in the thousands for the spiritualist meetings in the summer, with even more on the weekends! Later the spiritualist camp area became the Lake Lansing Amusement Park, and still later, Lake Lansing Park, a division of the Ingham County parks system.

The extremely high value placed on this token is based on the rarity of the town of issue, as it appears highly unlikely that other tokens from Haslett Park will surface, as none have been observed on the market since 1981!





THE ART DAVIS SOUVENIR COIN

"Boy, He sure could fly!"

This seems to be the inevitable answer whenever an oldtime Lansing resident is asked about Art Davis, one of Lansing's pioneer aviators. The Art Davis Air Show was started in Lansing in the 1920's, and seemed to carry a certain circus air about it, with the show lasting into the 1940's. As the show grew, so did the abilities of Davis and his crew, with many of the members of the show taking regional and national honors in the 1930's and 1940'5.

One of the blg attractions of the Art Davis Air Show was Clement Sohn, who thrilled spectators with his death defying free falls in the 1930's. Clem would jump from the plane, carrying a sack of flour to mark his fall of 6000 to 8000 feet before he opened his chute, often at altitudes under 1000 feet. Sohn later ploneered the "bat wing" jump from an airplane which involved the use of a pair of artificial wings to simulate flight before opening his parachute at the last possible moment. Sohn made his final jump at the Paris air show on April 25, 1937, and every bone in his body was broken when his parachute failed to open. A memorial plaque at Lansing's Eastern High School reads:

Art Davis ALL AMERICAN Air Show ADULT. 25c Nº 4870

CLEMENT A. SDHN

In memory of Clement A. Sohn who gave his life In Paris, France, April 25, 1937. It was his ambition to promote aviation by attempting as the original bat wing jumper the perfection of his art.

After the death of Sohn it appears that Charles Lauda took his place as the bat wing jumper for the Art Davis Air Show. Zmuda is illustrated in his bat wing outfit on the reverse of the token, thus helping to pin down the point of issue of the tokens as the late 1930's or early 1940's.

Other popular fliers for the Art Davis Air Show included Roger Don Rae and Robert "Bob" O'Dell, both of whom won in numerous events in national air shows. Marvey M. Hughes was popular due to stunts which included landing a light plane atop a platform on a moving automobile. Ted Abrams, the ploneer of aerial photography, got his start in that business when he took some photos during his job as a wing walker for Davis. Abrams, thinking that the photos might help sell rides on the planes, found out that people wanted the photos more than the ridest This resulted in the founding of the Abrams Aerial Survey Company, which has mapped a good part of the U.S., Latin America, and Africa by air.

Davis took a breif reprieve from his air show business during the war years of the early 1940's when he went into the Air Transport Command. After his loud complaints about "flying behind a desk" he was given a job ferrying multi-engine aircraft across the Pacific, even though he was in his late 40's. When he returned to his home In East Lansing he chose to build his own airfield, appropriately named Davis Field, approximately two miles north of East Lansing on Chandler Road. The field still operates today. He also restarted the air show, although it never reached again the heights it reached in the 1930's.

The Lansing City Lines, Inc. token is one of the more interesting (and expensive!) tokens ever issued in the city of Lansing. Although 10,000 pieces were originally struck, only about 8-10 pieces of the original mintage are known to collectors today. The tokens carry a \$150.00 catalog value in the new book on Michigan tokens by Paul Cunningham. Just why are these tokens so rare? Hopefully the history of the ousting of Lansing City Lines as outlined in the following paragraphs will explain this.

Lansing City Lines, incorporated began its Lansing bus operations in October of 1936 with the acquistion of City Transport Corporation, the then existing bus lines, for the sum of \$170,000. National City Lines, Inc., the Chicago based parent company of Lansing City Lines chose to name James A. Gibb, the former secretary-treasurer of City Transport, as the new manager of Lansing operations. Gibb remained in this position until May 12, 1938, the effective date of his resignation, later being replaced by William E. Cann.

May 12, 1938 marked the beginning of the end for Lansing City Lines. Gibb testified on November 29, 1938 that on May 12 he was called to a meeting at the office of Lansing Mayor Max A. Templeton, a meeting at which the mayor expressed an interest In seeing a new Lansing bus company organized. Gibb testified that he would go ahead with the backing of "proper city officials". On the following day (May 13) Gibb, Mayor Templeton, and Alderman Kircher saw J.W. Wilford, president of the Bank of Lansing "to get his ideas". The same day they conferred with Donald E. Bates, president of the REO Motor Car Company. Bates, according to Glbb, "expressed an interest in REO building some buses". Things remained rather quiet, at least outwardly, for a while. Lansing City Lines, complacent in its belief that its bus license would be good through its expiration date of April 30, 1939, called on Meyer & Wenthe of Chicago to strike 10,000 "school fare" tokens. The tokens designated a special fare for school age children and when used gave the company an idea which lines were used at what frequency by the children. The tokens were produced and shipped approximately September 9, 1938, just two

months before the Gibb-Templeton-REO conspiracy was to make itself apparent.

On November 14, 1938 the caldron of polltics and economics started on May 12 had reached a boil. The Lansing City Council voted on that date to suspend operations of Lansing City Lines effective at midnight on December 1, based on allegations, real or imagined, of poor bus service and unwillingness to change bus

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schedules to conform with the wishes of City Council. Such an action by the City Council would have left the city mithout a bus system, had there not already been a new bus system "in

On November 22, just eight days after the order to banish Lansing City Lines from the streets, the formation of a new bus company was announced in the Lansing State Journal. The headlines read "NEW CITY BUSES BEING BUILT ON CREDIT BY RED". The "new" company, Inter-City Coach Lines, Inc., was to have a cap. italization of \$100,000, although their cash assets at the time of publication were only \$12,000. REO Motors was to manufacture 40 buses for the new company "on the cuff" and was to accept \$40,000 in stock in the new company as a down payment on the buses, with the \$240,000 balance due for the buses to be repaid at 6% interest, with no finance charges, and no specific repayment

The "new" company, Inter-City Coach Lines, Inc., was headed by James A. Gibb, former head of Lansing City Lines. In reality, the company was not all that new; Gibb had been on the payroll of REO Motors since the first of September. REO had wanted an all REO bus fleet on the streets of Lansing as a showcase for their product line and thought it would be "good publicity". The new 40 bus fleet was scheduled to be on the road on December 1, 1936, the same day that Lansing City Lines was scheduled to be banished from the streets of Lansing. It seems incredible to me that RED could have built such a fleet in eight days; more likely the fleet construction was already well underway by then. More likely than not is that REO simply chose to announce the new fleet on November 22, when the hearings for Inter-City at the Michigan Public Utilities Commision necessitated it.

On November 28 the Lansing City Council voted to direct the police to prevent buses of Lansing City Lines, Inn. from operating on the streets of Lansing after midnight November 30, unless restrained from taking such action by the court, as well as directing the City Clerk, Miss Bertha Ray, to issue a licence to Inter-City Coach Lines. The East Lansing City Council also voted to grant the "new" firm a license to operate in East Lansing, pending approval from the Michigan Public Utilities Commision. The ante had thus been raised, and the chips scheduled to fall in the courtrooms November 29 & 30.

The battle between the Gibb-REO forces and Lansing City Lines reached its peak at the Michigan Public Utilities Commision hearing on November 29. A parade of witnesses was brought in to testify as to the "overcrowded and dangerous" conditions on the buses of Lansing City Lines, most of whom had more to gain by testifying against the line rather than for it. Drivers testified about having overcrowded buses; Mrs. Noel L. Smith, wife of a RED employee testified that "after being fortunate enough to get a seat on a 32 passanger bus carrying "80 to 85" passengers, she was sometimes driven off the bus by gas fumes from the motor". Gibb willingly testified that he overcrowded buses when he was manager of the company, as well as admitting to purchasing oil from Alderman Kircher's Union Oil Company. When asked about Mayor Max A. Templeton's involvement in the new bus company, as well as that pf Alderman Kircher, Gigg stated that their only interest was in "a home-owned transportation company". Gibb conveniently "forgot"

the words of the speakers at a political rally held at the REO plant a day or two before the moyoral election in Lansing; accusations were made that the REO employees were told to vote for Templeton and Kircher at this rally. When all was said and done, Inter-City had its approval to operate on the streets of Lansing, although it did not receive the Lansing-East Lansing permit that It had hoped for.

The November 30 hearing in Circuit Court, heard by Judge Hayden, was the last chance for Lansing City Lines to maintain their Lansing service. The company argued that their license, set to expire on April 30, 1939 gave the company the right to continue operations through that date, since there had been no formal complaints about their service. The lawyers for the city argued that the operation of buses in the city was understood to be on a day to day basis, with the licensing fee being merely a convenient means of paying for the service. The lawyers for the city also noted that the City Council had authorized a refund of the unused portion of the license fee on November 28. Judge Hayden ruled that the licensing fee was indeed a fee basis rather than a guarantee of continuing service, since the Lansing city Lines company did not have a "franchise" for city operations. Hayden's ruling also upheld the actions of Lansino City Council banning Lansing City Lines from Intracity Lansing service. Midnight would soon approach, and with it the end of Lansing service by Lansing City Lines.

Midnight November 30 came and went, and with the morning of December 1 came a city with two bus lines and a rather confused ridership. Lansing City Lines chose to continue their Lansing-East Lansing runs under their Michigan Public Utilities Permit; they were not permitted to let Lansing passengers off at any point other than the Lansing or East Lansing terminals. Inter-City Coach Lines was the new Lansing city carrier, but was not allowed yet to carry passengers into East Lansing. Lansing City Lines, Inc. chose to make a statement in a half page advertisement in the December 1 Lansing State Journal, which was partially directed to its ridership and partially aimed at the Lansing political machine. The text of the advertisement reads as follows:

TO OUR BUS PATRONS IN LANSING AND EAST LANSING

This is public assurance that services of Lansing City Lines, Inc., will be maintained to the fullest extent permitted by circumstances. This means that our service between downtown Lansing and East Lansing will continue without alteration, under our certificate from the Michigan Public Utilities Commision and the East Lansing City Council. Over present routes, our buses will continue to operate on Michigan Avenue and along Saginaw Street, between the two cities. Patrons of our lines may, as they have in the past, board our buses at any corner or designated

stopping place along these routes, and ride to the terminal point in Lansing or East Lansing.

We regret that the operation of a competing bus line, authorized by the We trust that the public of Lansing and East Lansing will not lose faith.

Lansing City Council, amkes it necessary that we discontinue our issuance or acceptance of transfers between our Lansing and East Lansing buses and city buses operating in the city of Lansing. It is unfortunate that the elimination of transfer priviliges will involve the payment of a double fare. Our fare will, of course, continue at 5 cents, a rate which we originated in Lansing. We came here in good faith, two years ago, to serve Lansing and East Lansing.

we regard the present circumstances as temporary. Right will always prevail. We believe that through our efforts, Lansing has enjoyed the best trans.

Our first consideration has been the public. While this policy may explain our present circumstances of being ruled from the streets by the Lansing City Council, we are strong in our conviction that the policy of serving the public is the successful one in the long run.

We have never sought to curry favor at the City Hall. In some quarters this has been regarded as a poor policy in Lansing, but it has never been found in any of the 21 other cities of the mid-west in which systems of National City Lines, Inc., operate today.

We have never been harassed by political machinations elsewhere; we have never before been confronted by City Hall intrigue. And while the experience is new, and not altogether pleasant, we still maintain our implicit belief that although "It CAN Happen Here", it can't last forever.

So, pending developments, we will maintain or service insofar as the action of Lansing city government permits.

LANSING CITY LINES, INCORPORATED

This statement by Lansing City Lines, Inc. probably served more as a sulogy for the company than a business advertisement. The life of Lansing City Lines as a Lansing carrier was just about over, as both Short Way Lines and Inter-City Coach Lines applied to the Michigan Public Utilities Commision for Lansing-East Lansing permits on the second of December. Inter-City finally received its permit and with it the right to compete for the lucrative Lansing-East Lansing routes. The incorporation of the East Lansing foutes into the Lansing system made perfect sense due to the intertwining of business and commerce in the

Lansing City Lines finally dropped out of the Lansing transportation market in 1939, and sold its garage and office to Inter-City by 1940.

So why are the tokens of Lansing City Lines, Inc. so rare? One would think that with a mintage of 10,000 pleces that there would be more than eight to ten known specimens. No one has the absolute answer to this question, but there are several factors which could have contributed to the low survival rate of this token. These factors include:

- 1. The Lansing City Lines tokens were only in use for about two and a half months. Most of the pieces were simply never issued by the company and returned to the company's home office in Chicago after the loss of the Lansing license.
- 2. The tokens that remained unissued probably represented little more than bad memories at the least or scrap metal at the most to the home office. Even if the pieces were not sold as scrap immediately there is a good likelihood that they found their way to the melting pot during the metal shortages during World War II.
 - 3. Knowing the propensity of school age children for losing things, and for throwing away items like tokens that "aren't any good any more" it would appear printed that has printed when the same him to be

likely that most of the tokens that were issued have either been lost or thrown out. 4. One possibility is that in some basement, office, or attic there is a tremendous hoard of these tokens. Maybe some day a hoard of these will appear.

One might ask just why the tokens of Lansing City Lines, Inc. are so expensive. Three simple words explain this - Supply and Demand. There is a very limited supply of these tokens in the marketplace today, with a much greater number of vectorists (transportation token collectors) wishing to own such pieces. with this increasing demand has come increasing prices, with the tokens having increased from a \$10.00 catalog value in 1976 to a catalog value of \$150.00 in 1988.
